1.8 1.9	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2019 Supplement, section 462A.37, subdivision 2, is amended to read:
1.10	Subd. 2. Authorization. (a) The agency may issue up to \$30,000,000 in aggregate
1.11	principal amount of housing infrastructure bonds in one or more series to which the payment
1.12	made under this section may be pledged. The housing infrastructure bonds authorized in
1.13	this subdivision may be issued to fund loans, or grants for the purposes of clause (4), on
1.14	terms and conditions the agency deems appropriate, made for one or more of the following
1.15	purposes:
1.16	(1) to finance the costs of the construction, acquisition, and rehabilitation of supportive
