(a) Upon motion of an obligee or the public authority, which has been properly served 4.12 on the obligor by first class mail at the last known address or in person, and if at a hearing, 4.13 the court finds that (1) the obligor is in arrears in court-ordered child support or maintenance 4.14 payments, or both, in an amount equal to or greater than six times the obligor's total monthly 4.15 support and maintenance payments and is not in compliance with a written payment 4.16 agreement pursuant to section 518A.69, or (2) has failed, after receiving notice, to comply 4.17 with a subpoena relating to a paternity or child support proceeding, the court may direct the 4.18 4.19 commissioner of natural resources to suspend or bar receipt of the obligor's recreational license or licenses.  4.27 agreements pursuant to section 518A.69. A motion to reinstate a recreational license by the
- 4.28 <u>obligor, obligee, or public authority may be granted if the court finds:</u>

7.2	with the court and serve the required documents on each party and the tribal IV-D agency,
7.3	regardless of whether the tribal IV-D agency is a party.
7.4	(c) A party's or tribal IV-D agency's motion to transfer must be accompanied by an
7.5	affidavit setting forth facts in support of its motion.
7.6	(d) When the tribal IV-D agency has not filed a motion to transfer to tribal court, an
7.7	affidavit of the tribal IV-D agency stating whether the tribal IV-D agency provides services
7.8	to a party must be filed and served on each party within 15 days from the date of service of
7.9	the motion.

7.21	tribal court, a party or tribal IV-D agency must file with the court and serve on each party

7.25	objection to the motion to transfer to a tribal court, the district court must conduct a hearing.
