1.8	This act may be referred to as the Women of Color Opportunity Act.

1.11	Section 1. EMERGING ENTREPRENEUR LOAN PROGRAM; APPROPRIATION.			
1.12	\$2,000,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$2,000,000 in fiscal year 2023 are appropriated from			
1.13	the general fund to the commissioner of employment and economic development for the			
1.14	Minnesota emerging entrepreneur loan program under Minnesota Statutes, section 116M.18.			
1.15	Funds available under this section are for transfer into the emerging entrepreneur program			
1.16	special revenue fund account created under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 116M, and are			
1.17	available until expended. Of these amounts, \$1,000,000 each year is for loans targeted to			
1.18	entrepreneurs who are women of color and up to four percent is for administration and			
1.19	monitoring of the program.

2.6	is for grants to provide services and technical assistance targeted to entrepreneurs who are
