SPECIAL PENALTY EXCEPTION. 2.1 (a) The interest provisions under Minnesota Statutes, section 289A.55, and penalty for 2.2 failure to pay tax provisions under Minnesota Statutes, section 289A.60, subdivision 1, do 2.3 not apply to late payments of tax arising from an order of the commissioner assessing 2.4 additional income tax on a capital gain that was previously deferred under section 1031 of 2.5 the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended through December 16, 2016, for taxable 2.6 years beginning after December 31, 2017, and ending before January 1, 2019.
