(b) At least one public school teacher, administrator, or program staff member and at 2.5 least one service-learning specialist, service-learning coordinator, curriculum specialist, or 2.6 other qualified employee designated to develop and share expertise in implementing 2.7 service-learning best practices who are employed at a public school, tribal contract school, 2.8 or charter school must work with students to form a student-adult partnership. The partnership 2.9 must include at least one community-based organization, community education program, 2.10 state or federal agency, or political subdivision. A grantee designated as leader grantee may be required to meet additional leader 4.1 grant requirements as established by the commissioner in the grant application criteria 4.2 4.3 developed by the commissioner. The commissioner may renew a grant annually as appropriated funds are available and consistent with the grant criteria established in this 4.4 section and other criteria the commissioner may establish for grant eligibility or for renewing 4.5 a grant. In order to receive a grant, a partnership must provide a 50 percent match in funds 4.6 or in-kind contributions unless the commissioner waives the match requirement for an 4.7 applicant serving a high number of students whose families meet federal poverty guidelines. 4.8 A partnership grantee must allocate the grant amount according to its grant application. The 4.9 partnership must convey 50 percent of the actual grant amount to at least one 4.10 community-based organization, community education program, state or federal agency, or 4.11 political subdivision to help implement or defray the direct costs of carrying out the 4.12 4.13 service-learning strategies and activities described in the partnership's grant application. Subd. 3. Evaluation. The commissioner of education must evaluate innovative, incubator, 4.14 service-learning awarded grants based on the educational and developmental outcomes of 4.15 participating students and on member districts' progress toward meeting at least one goal 4.16 of the world's best workforce goals in accordance with section 120B.11 or the state plan 4.17 submitted and approved under the most recent reauthorization of the Elementary and 4.18 Secondary Education Act. The commissioner must evaluate the success of service-learning 4.19 grants based on the community outcomes achieved through student service-learning 4.20 experiences and the corresponding student service activities.
