[136A.1465] MINNESOTA COMMITMENT TO HIGHER EDUCATION 1.6 ACT. 1.7 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** The following terms have the meanings given: 1.8 (1) "eligible student" means a resident student under section 136A.101, subdivision 8, 1.9 who is enrolled in any public postsecondary educational institution or Tribal college; 1.10 (2) "office" means the Office of Higher Education; 1.11 (3) "public postsecondary educational institution" means an institution operated by this 1.12 state, the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota, or a Tribal college; 1.13 (4) "scholarship" means funds to pay 100 percent of tuition and fees remaining after 1.14 deducting grants and other scholarships, except for the Pell grant; and 1.15 (5) "Tribal college" means a college defined in section 136A.1796, subdivision 1, 1.16 paragraph (c). 1.17 Subd. 2. Conditions for eligibility. A scholarship may be awarded to an eligible student 1.18 who: 1.19 (1) has completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) or the state 1.20

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aid application;

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2.1	(2) has an adjusted gross household income below \$120,000;
2.2	(3) has not earned a baccalaureate degree at the time the scholarship is awarded;
2.3	(4) is enrolled in at least one credit per fall, spring, or summer semester; and
2.4	(5) is meeting satisfactory academic progress as defined in section 136A.101, subdivision

2.6	Subd. 3. Scholarship. Beginning in the 2024-2025 academic year, scholarships shall
2.7	be awarded to eligible students in an amount not to exceed 100 percent of tuition and fees
2.8	after grants and other scholarships are deducted, except for the Pell grant.
2.9	Subd. 4. Duration of scholarship authorized. (a) Each scholarship is for a period of
2.10	one semester. A scholarship may be renewed provided that the eligible student continues
2.11	to meet the conditions of eligibility.
2.12	(b) Scholarships may be provided to an eligible student for up to 60 credits for the
2.13	completion of a certificate or an associate degree and up to 120 credits for the completion
2.14	of a bachelor's degree. The maximum credits for which a student is eligible is a total of 120
2.15	credits.
2.16	(c) The commissioner shall determine a time frame by which the eligible student must
2.17	complete the credential.
2.18	Subd. 5. Termination of scholarship authorized. A scholarship is terminated upon
2.19	occurrence of:
2.20	(1) failure to meet satisfactory academic progress as defined in section 136A.101,
2.21	subdivision 10; or
2.22	(2) substantial noncompliance by the eligible student with the requirements of the
2.23	program.
2.24	Subd. 6. Account established; appropriation. An account is created in the special
2.25	revenue fund for receiving money to provide scholarship awards. Money deposited in the
2.26	account is appropriated to the commissioner of the Office of Higher Education for scholarship
2.27	awards.
2.28	Subd. 7. Office administration. The office is authorized to administer the program.
2.29	The office shall calculate the scholarship amount and determine tuition and fees for each
2.30	eligible institution. If funds are insufficient, the office shall determine the scholarship amount
2.31	or number of scholarships awarded. The office may determine the order in which other
2.32	grants and scholarships are deducted when determining the scholarship amount. If a student

<u>\$3</u>	316,893,000 in fiscal year 2025 is transferred from the general fund to the account in
