1.10	Section 1. [122A.051] CODE OF ETHICS.
1.11	Subdivision 1. Scope. Each teacher, upon entering the teaching profession, assumes a
1.12	number of obligations, one of which is to adhere to a set of principles that defines professional
1.13	conduct. These principles are reflected in the code of ethics, which sets forth to the education
1.14	profession and the public it serves standards of professional conduct. This code applies to
1.15	all persons licensed according to rules established by the Professional Educator Licensing
1.16	and Standards Board.
1.17	Subd. 2. Standards of professional conduct. (a) A teacher must provide professional
1.18	education services in a nondiscriminatory manner, including not discriminating on the basis
1.19	of political, ideological, or religious beliefs.
1.20	(b) A teacher must make reasonable effort to protect students from conditions harmful
1.21	to health and safety.
1.22	(c) In accordance with state and federal laws, a teacher must disclose confidential
1.23	information about individuals only when a compelling professional purpose is served or
1.24	when required by law.

2.1	(d) A teacher must take reasonable disciplinary action in exercising the authority to
2.2	provide an atmosphere conducive to learning.
2.3	(e) A teacher must not use professional relationships with students, parents, and
2.4	colleagues to personal advantage.
2.5	(f) A teacher must delegate authority for teaching responsibilities only to licensed
2.6	personnel or as otherwise provided by law.
2.7	(g) A teacher must not deliberately suppress or distort subject matter.

2.8	(h) A teacher must not knowingly falsify or misrepresent records or facts relating to that
2.9	teacher's own qualifications or to other teachers' qualifications.

2.13	if properly or provisionally licensed for that position.

22.13 (i) The local welfare agency responsible for conducting a family assessment or investigation shall collect available and relevant information to determine child safety, risk 22.14 of subsequent child maltreatment, and family strengths and needs and share not public 22.15 information with an Indian's tribal social services agency without violating any law of the 22.16 state that may otherwise impose duties of confidentiality on the local welfare agency in 22.17 order to implement the tribal state agreement. The local welfare agency or the agency 22.18 responsible for investigating the report shall collect available and relevant information to 22.19 ascertain whether maltreatment occurred and whether protective services are needed. 22.20 Information collected includes, when relevant, information with regard to the person reporting 22.21 the alleged maltreatment, including the nature of the reporter's relationship to the child and 22.22 to the alleged offender, and the basis of the reporter's knowledge for the report; the child 22.23 allegedly being maltreated; the alleged offender; the child's caretaker; and other collateral 22.24 sources having relevant information related to the alleged maltreatment. The local welfare 22.25 agency or the agency responsible for investigating the report may make a determination of 22.26 no maltreatment early in an investigation, and close the case and retain immunity, if the 22.27 collected information shows no basis for a full investigation. 22.28

Information relevant to the assessment or investigation must be asked for, and mayinclude:

(1) the child's sex and age; prior reports of maltreatment, including any maltreatment
reports that were screened out and not accepted for assessment or investigation; information
relating to developmental functioning; credibility of the child's statement; and whether the
information provided under this clause is consistent with other information collected during
the course of the assessment or investigation;

(2) the alleged offender's age, a record check for prior reports of maltreatment, and

to make a statement. The alleged offender may submit supporting documentation relevant

Notwithstanding the data's 23.20 classification in the possession of any other agency, data acquired by the local welfare 23.21 agency or the agency responsible for assessing or investigating the report during the course 23.22 of the assessment or investigation are private data on individuals and must be maintained 23.23 in accordance with subdivision 11. In conducting an assessment or investigation involving a school facility as defined in subdivision 2, paragraph (c), the commissioner of education shall collect investigative reports and data that are relevant to a report of maltreatment and are from local law enforcement and the school facility.

(j) Upon receipt of a report, the local welfare agency shall conduct a face-to-face contact
with the child reported to be maltreated and with the child's primary caregiver sufficient to
complete a safety assessment and ensure the immediate safety of the child. The face-to-face

contact with the child and primary caregiver shall occur immediately if sexual abuse or 24.1 substantial child endangerment is alleged and within five calendar days for all other reports. 24.2 If the alleged offender was not already interviewed as the primary caregiver, the local welfare 24.3 agency shall also conduct a face-to-face interview with the alleged offender in the early 24.4 stages of the assessment or investigation. (b) After conducting a family assessment, the local welfare agency shall determine
whether services are needed to address the safety of the child and other family members
and the risk of subsequent maltreatment.

(c) After conducting an investigation, the local welfare agency shall make two
determinations: first, whether maltreatment has occurred; and second, whether child
protective services are needed. No determination of maltreatment shall be made when the
alleged perpetrator is a child under the age of ten.

(d) If the commissioner of education conducts an assessment or investigation, the 25.8 commissioner shall determine whether maltreatment occurred and what corrective or 25.9 protective action was taken by the school facility. If a determination is made that 25.10 maltreatment has occurred, the commissioner shall report to the employer, the school board, 25.11 and any appropriate licensing entity the determination that maltreatment occurred and what 25.12 corrective or protective action was taken by the school facility. care have not taken or are not likely to take actions to protect the child from maltreatment

child's parent, guardian, or other person responsible for the child's care in good faith selects
and depends upon spiritual means or prayer for treatment or care of disease or remedial care
