A bill for an act

1.1 relating to liquor; regulating the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages;
 1.2 authorizing various licenses; clarifying certain filing requirements; amending
 1.3 Minnesota Statutes 2012, sections 297G.07, subdivision 1; 340A.101, by adding
 1.4 subdivisions; 340A.301, subdivision 9; 340A.315, subdivision 2, by adding
 1.5 subdivisions; 340A.316; 340A.404, subdivisions 2, 5; 340A.415; 340A.508,
 1.6 by adding a subdivision; 340A.510, subdivision 2; Minnesota Statutes 2013
 1.7 Supplement, section 340A.301, subdivisions 6b, 6c, 6d, 7; proposing coding for
 1.8 new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapters 297G; 340A; repealing Laws 2012,
 1.9 chapter 235, section 11.

1.11 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.12 Section 1. **[297G.031] FARM WINERY.**

1.13 Farm wineries licensed under section 340A.315 shall be treated as wholesalers
 1.14 for the excise tax imposed on certain wines. Tax payments and returns are required in
 1.15 relation to samples given and in relation to the sale of wine on the farm winery premises
 1.16 permitted under chapter 340A. Returns must be made in a form and manner prescribed by
 1.17 the commissioner, and must contain any other information required by the commissioner.

1.18 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2014.

1.19 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 297G.07, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

1.20 Subdivision 1. **Exemptions.** The following are not subject to the excise tax:

1.21 (1) Sales by a manufacturer, brewer, or wholesaler for shipment outside the state
 1.22 in interstate commerce.

1.23 (2) Alcoholic beverages sold or transferred between Minnesota wholesalers.

1.24 (3) Sales to common carriers engaged in interstate transportation of passengers,
 1.25 except as provided in this chapter.

2.1 (4) Malt beverages served by a brewery for on-premise consumption at no charge, or
 2.2 distributed to brewery employees for on-premise consumption under a labor contract.

2.3 (5) Shipments of wine to Minnesota residents under section 340A.417.

2.4 (6) Fruit juices naturally fermented or beer naturally brewed in the home for family
 2.5 use and not sold or offered for sale.

2.6 (7) Sales of wine for sacramental purposes under section 340A.316.

2.7 (8) Alcoholic beverages sold to authorized manufacturers of food products or
 2.8 pharmaceutical firms. The alcoholic beverage must be used exclusively in the manufacture
 2.9 of food products or medicines. For purposes of this clause, "manufacturer" means a
 2.10 person who manufactures food products intended for sale to wholesalers or retailers for
 2.11 ultimate sale to the consumer.

2.12 (9) Liqueur-filled candy.

2.13 (10) Sales to a federal agency, that the state of Minnesota is prohibited from taxing
 2.14 under the Constitution or laws of the United States or under the Constitution of Minnesota.

2.15 (11) Sales to Indian tribes as defined in section 297G.08.

2.16 (12) Shipments of intoxicating liquor from foreign countries to diplomatic personnel
 2.17 of foreign countries assigned to service in this state.

2.18 (13) Shipments of bulk distilled spirits or bulk wine to farm wineries licensed under
 2.19 section 340A.315 for input to the final product.

2.20 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** The amendment to clause (6) is effective the day following
 2.21 final enactment. Clause (13) is effective July 1, 2014.

2.22 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.101, is amended by adding a
 2.23 subdivision to read:

2.24 Subd. 4a. **Bulk distilled spirits.** "Bulk distilled spirits" means distilled spirits in a
 2.25 container having a capacity in excess of one gallon.

2.26 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2014.

2.27 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.101, is amended by adding a
 2.28 subdivision to read:

2.29 Subd. 4b. **Bulk wine.** "Bulk wine" means wine in a container having a capacity
 2.30 of five or more gallons.

2.31 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2014.

2.32 Sec. 5. **[340A.22] MICRODISTILLERIES.**

3.1 Subdivision 1. **Activities.** (a) A microdistillery licensed under section 340A.301,
3.2 subdivision 6c, may provide on its premises samples of distilled spirits manufactured on
3.3 its premises in an amount not to exceed 15 milliliters per variety per person. No more than
3.4 45 milliliters may be sampled under this paragraph by any person on any day.

3.5 (b) A microdistillery may sell cocktails to the public pursuant to subdivision 2.

3.6 Subd. 2. **Cocktail room license.** (a) A municipality, including a city with a
3.7 municipal liquor store, may issue the holder of a microdistillery license under section
3.8 340A.301, subdivision 6c, a microdistillery cocktail room license. A microdistillery
3.9 cocktail room license authorizes on-sale of distilled liquor produced by the distiller for
3.10 consumption on the premises of or adjacent to one distillery location owned by the
3.11 distiller. Nothing in this subdivision precludes the holder of a microdistillery cocktail
3.12 room license from also holding a license to operate a restaurant at the distillery. Section
3.13 340A.409 shall apply to a license issued under this subdivision. All provisions of this
3.14 chapter that apply to a retail liquor license shall apply to a license issued under this
3.15 subdivision unless the provision is explicitly inconsistent with this subdivision.

3.16 (b) A distiller may have only one cocktail room license under this subdivision,
3.17 and may not have an ownership interest in a distillery licensed under section 340A.301,
3.18 subdivision 6, paragraph (a).

3.19 (c) The municipality shall impose a licensing fee on a distiller holding a
3.20 microdistillery cocktail room license under this subdivision, subject to limitations
3.21 applicable to license fees under section 340A.408, subdivision 2, paragraph (a).

3.22 (d) A municipality shall, within ten days of the issuance of a license under this
3.23 subdivision, inform the commissioner of the licensee's name and address and trade name,
3.24 and the effective date and expiration date of the license. The municipality shall also
3.25 inform the commissioner of a license transfer, cancellation, suspension, or revocation
3.26 during the license period.

3.27 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

3.28 Sec. 6. Minnesota Statutes 2013 Supplement, section 340A.301, subdivision 6b,
3.29 is amended to read:

3.30 Subd. 6b. **Brewer taproom license.** (a) A municipality, including a city with a
3.31 municipal liquor store, may issue the holder of a brewer's license under subdivision 6,
3.32 clause (c), (i), or (j), a brewer taproom license. A brewer taproom license authorizes on-sale
3.33 of malt liquor produced by the brewer for consumption on the premises of or adjacent
3.34 to one brewery location owned by the brewer. Nothing in this subdivision precludes the
3.35 holder of a brewer taproom license from also holding a license to operate a restaurant at

4.1 the brewery. Section 340A.409 shall apply to a license issued under this subdivision. All
4.2 provisions of this chapter that apply to a retail liquor license shall apply to a license issued
4.3 under this subdivision unless the provision is explicitly inconsistent with this subdivision.

4.4 (b) A brewer may only have one taproom license under this subdivision, and may
4.5 not have an ownership interest in a brewery licensed under subdivision 6, clause (d).

4.6 (c) A municipality may not issue a brewer taproom license to a brewer if the brewer
4.7 seeking the license, or any person having an economic interest in the brewer seeking the
4.8 license or exercising control over the brewer seeking the license, is a brewer that brews
4.9 more than 250,000 barrels of malt liquor annually or a winery that produces more than
4.10 250,000 gallons of wine annually.

4.11 (d) The municipality shall impose a licensing fee on a brewer holding a brewer
4.12 taproom license under this subdivision, subject to limitations applicable to license fees
4.13 under section 340A.408, subdivision 2, paragraph (a).

4.14 (e) A municipality shall, within ten days of the issuance of a license under this
4.15 subdivision, inform the commissioner of the licensee's name and address and trade name,
4.16 and the effective date and expiration date of the license. The municipality shall also
4.17 inform the commissioner of a license transfer, cancellation, suspension, or revocation
4.18 during the license period.

4.19 (f) Notwithstanding section 340A.504, subdivision 3, a taproom may be open and
4.20 may conduct on-sale business on Sundays if authorized by the municipality.

4.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

4.22 Sec. 7. Minnesota Statutes 2013 Supplement, section 340A.301, subdivision 6c,
4.23 is amended to read:

4.24 Subd. 6c. **Microdistilleries.** ~~(a) A microdistillery may provide on its premises~~
4.25 ~~samples of distilled spirits manufactured on its premises, in an amount not to exceed 15~~
4.26 ~~milliliters per variety per person. No more than 45 milliliters may be sampled under~~
4.27 ~~this paragraph by any person on any day.~~

4.28 (b) The commissioner shall establish a fee for licensing microdistilleries that
4.29 adequately covers the cost of issuing the license and other inspection requirements. The
4.30 fees shall be deposited in an account in the special revenue fund and are appropriated to
4.31 the commissioner for the purposes of this subdivision.

4.32 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

5.1 Sec. 8. Minnesota Statutes 2013 Supplement, section 340A.301, subdivision 6d,
5.2 is amended to read:

5.3 Subd. 6d. **Small brewer license.** (a) A brewer licensed under subdivision 6, clause
5.4 (c), (i), or (j), may be issued a license by a municipality for off-sale of malt liquor at its
5.5 licensed premises that has been produced and packaged by the brewer. The license must be
5.6 approved by the commissioner. The amount of malt liquor sold at off-sale may not exceed
5.7 500 barrels annually. Off-sale of malt liquor shall be limited to the legal hours for off-sale at
5.8 exclusive liquor stores in the jurisdiction in which the brewer is located, and the malt liquor
5.9 sold off-sale must be removed from the premises before the applicable off-sale closing
5.10 time at exclusive liquor stores. The malt liquor shall be packed in 64-ounce containers
5.11 commonly known as "growlers" or in 750 milliliter bottles. The containers or bottles shall
5.12 bear a twist-type closure, cork, stopper, or plug. At the time of the sale, a paper or plastic
5.13 adhesive band, strip, or sleeve shall be applied to the container or bottle and extended over
5.14 the top of the twist-type closure, cork, stopper, or plug forming a seal that must be broken
5.15 upon opening of the container or bottle. The adhesive band, strip, or sleeve shall bear the
5.16 name and address of the brewer. The containers or bottles shall be identified as malt
5.17 liquor, contain the name of the malt liquor, bear the name and address of the brewer selling
5.18 the malt liquor, and shall be considered intoxicating liquor unless the alcoholic content is
5.19 labeled as otherwise in accordance with the provisions of Minnesota Rules, part 7515.1100.

5.20 (b) A brewer may, but is not required to, refill any growler with malt liquor for
5.21 off-sale at the request of a customer. A brewer refilling a growler must do so at its licensed
5.22 premises and the growler must be filled at the tap at the time of sale. A growler refilled
5.23 under this paragraph must be sealed and labeled in the manner described in paragraph (a).

5.24 ~~(b)~~ (c) A brewer may only have one license under this subdivision.

5.25 ~~(e)~~ (d) A municipality may not issue a license under this subdivision to a brewer if
5.26 the brewer seeking the license, or any person having an economic interest in the brewer
5.27 seeking the license or exercising control over the brewer seeking the license, is a brewer
5.28 that brews more than 20,000 barrels of its own brands of malt liquor annually or a winery
5.29 that produces more than 250,000 gallons of wine annually.

5.30 ~~(d)~~ (e) The municipality shall impose a licensing fee on a brewer holding a license
5.31 under this subdivision, subject to limitations applicable to license fees under section
5.32 340A.408, subdivision 3, paragraph (a).

5.33 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

5.34 Sec. 9. Minnesota Statutes 2013 Supplement, section 340A.301, subdivision 7, is
5.35 amended to read:

6.1 Subd. 7. **Interest in other business.** (a) Except as provided in this subdivision,
6.2 a holder of a license as a manufacturer, brewer, importer, or wholesaler may not have
6.3 any ownership, in whole or in part, in a business holding a retail intoxicating liquor or
6.4 3.2 percent malt liquor license. The commissioner may not issue a license under this
6.5 section to a manufacturer, brewer, importer, or wholesaler if a retailer of intoxicating
6.6 liquor has a direct or indirect interest in the manufacturer, brewer, importer, or wholesaler.
6.7 A manufacturer or wholesaler of intoxicating liquor may use or have property rented
6.8 for retail intoxicating liquor sales only if the manufacturer or wholesaler has owned the
6.9 property continuously since November 1, 1933. A retailer of intoxicating liquor may not
6.10 use or have property rented for the manufacture or wholesaling of intoxicating liquor.

6.11 (b) A brewer licensed under subdivision 6, clause (d), may be issued an on-sale
6.12 intoxicating liquor or 3.2 percent malt liquor license by a municipality for a restaurant
6.13 operated in the place of manufacture. Notwithstanding section 340A.405, a brewer who
6.14 holds an on-sale license issued pursuant to this paragraph may, with the approval of the
6.15 commissioner, be issued a license by a municipality for off-sale of malt liquor produced
6.16 and packaged on the licensed premises. Off-sale of malt liquor shall be limited to the
6.17 legal hours for off-sale at exclusive liquor stores in the jurisdiction in which the brewer
6.18 is located, and the malt liquor sold off-sale must be removed from the premises before
6.19 the applicable off-sale closing time at exclusive liquor stores. The malt liquor shall be
6.20 packaged in 64-ounce containers commonly known as "growlers" or in 750 milliliter
6.21 bottles. The containers or bottles shall bear a twist-type closure, cork, stopper, or plug. At
6.22 the time of the sale, a paper or plastic adhesive band, strip, or sleeve shall be applied to the
6.23 container or bottle and extend over the top of the twist-type closure, cork, stopper, or plug
6.24 forming a seal that must be broken upon opening of the container or bottle. The adhesive
6.25 band, strip, or sleeve shall bear the name and address of the brewer. The containers or
6.26 bottles shall be identified as malt liquor, contain the name of the malt liquor, bear the name
6.27 and address of the brewer selling the malt liquor, and shall be considered intoxicating
6.28 liquor unless the alcoholic content is labeled as otherwise in accordance with the
6.29 provisions of Minnesota Rules, part 7515.1100. A brewer may, but is not required to, refill
6.30 any growler with malt liquor for off-sale at the request of a customer. A brewer refilling a

6.36 an interest in other retail on-sale licenses, but may not have an ownership interest in whole

7.1 or in part, or be an officer, director, agent, or employee of, any other manufacturer, brewer,
 7.2 importer, or wholesaler, or be an affiliate thereof whether the affiliation is corporate or by
 7.3 management, direction, or control. Notwithstanding this prohibition, a brewer licensed
 7.4 under subdivision 6, clause (d), may be an affiliate or subsidiary company of a brewer
 7.5 licensed in Minnesota or elsewhere if that brewer's only manufacture of malt liquor is:

7.6 (i) manufacture licensed under subdivision 6, clause (d);

7.7 (ii) manufacture in another state for consumption exclusively in a restaurant located
 7.8 in the place of manufacture; or

7.9 (iii) manufacture in another state for consumption primarily in a restaurant located
 7.10 in or immediately adjacent to the place of manufacture if the brewer was licensed under
 7.11 subdivision 6, clause (d), on January 1, 1995.

7.12 (c) Except as provided in subdivision 7a, no brewer as defined in subdivision 7a or
 7.13 importer may have any interest, in whole or in part, directly or indirectly, in the license,
 7.14 business, assets, or corporate stock of a licensed malt liquor wholesaler.

7.15 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

7.16 Sec. 10. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.301, subdivision 9, is amended to read:

7.17 Subd. 9. **Unlicensed manufacture.** (a) Nothing in this chapter requires a license for
 7.18 the natural fermentation of fruit juices or brewing of beer in the home for family use.

7.19 (b) Naturally fermented fruit juices or beer made under this subdivision may be
 7.20 removed from the premises where made for use at organized affairs, exhibitions, or
 7.21 competitions, including, but not limited to, homemaker's contests, tastings, or judging.

7.22 (c) For purposes of this subdivision, "tastings" means an event where the general
 7.23 public may sample unlicensed naturally fermented fruit juices or beer.

7.24 (d) Beverages produced pursuant to this subdivision may be sampled or used in
 7.25 tastings provided that the beverage is made and transported in containers and equipment
 7.26 that shall not allow the migration of toxic substances.

7.27 (e) Public notice meeting the requirements of this paragraph must be given in writing
 7.28 or signage at any tasting. The notice shall include disclosure that the unlicensed naturally
 7.29 fermented fruit juices or beer being offered is homemade and not subject to state inspection,
 7.30 and may be consumed by persons over the age of 21 at their own risk. The notice must
 7.31 include the name and address of the person who processed and bottled the beverage.

7.32 (f) Naturally fermented fruit juices or beer removed under this subdivision may not
 7.33 be sold or offered for sale.

7.34 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

8.1 Sec. 11. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.315, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

8.2 Subd. 2. **Sales.** A license authorizes the sale, on the farm winery premises, of table,
8.3 sparkling, or fortified wines produced by that farm winery at on-sale or off-sale, in retail, or
8.4 wholesale lots in total quantities not in excess of ~~50,000~~ 75,000 gallons in a calendar year,
8.5 glassware, wine literature and accessories, cheese and cheese spreads, other wine-related
8.6 food items, and the dispensing of free samples of the wines offered for sale. Sales at on-sale
8.7 and off-sale may be made on Sundays between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 midnight. Labels for
8.8 each type or brand produced must be registered with the commissioner, without fee prior
8.9 to sale. A farm winery may provide samples of distilled spirits manufactured pursuant to
8.10 subdivision 7, on the farm winery premises, but may sell the distilled spirits only through a
8.11 licensed wholesaler. Samples of distilled spirits may not exceed 15 milliliters per variety.

8.15 **Subd. 10. Storage.** A farm winery may store finished wine and distilled spirits in
8.16 a noncontiguous warehouse location, provided that the chosen location complies with
8.17 Minnesota Rules, part 7515.0300, subpart 12, and any other state or federal requirements.
8.18 Cartage of finished goods between the farm winery and warehouse must be continuously
8.19 in the possession of a motor carrier of property as defined in section 221.012, subdivision
8.20 27, or carried in a motor vehicle owned, leased, or rented by the farm winery.

8.21 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2014.

8.22 Sec. 13. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.315, is amended by adding a
8.23 subdivision to read:

8.24 **Subd. 11. Bulk wine or distilled spirits.** If no wholesaler is able to provide
8.25 bulk wine or bulk distilled spirits, a farm winery may purchase either bulk wine or bulk
8.26 distilled spirits for purposes allowed under this chapter from any available source allowed
8.27 under federal law.

8.28 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective July 1, 2014.

8.29 Sec. 14. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.316, is amended to read:

8.30 **340A.316 SACRAMENTAL WINE.**

9.1 The commissioner may issue a license to a bona fide religious book or supply store
 9.2 for the importation and sale of wine exclusively for sacramental purposes. The holder of a
 9.3 sacramental wine license may sell wine intended by the manufacturer or the wholesaler for
 9.4 sacramental purposes only to a rabbi, priest, or minister of a church, or other established
 9.5 religious organization, if the purchaser certifies in writing that the wine will be used
 9.6 exclusively for sacramental purposes in religious ceremonies. The annual fee for a
 9.7 sacramental wine license is \$50, inclusive of a retail card required under Minnesota Rules,
 9.8 part 7515.0210. A seller of sacramental wine does not need insurance required under
 9.9 section 340A.409. A rabbi, priest, or minister of a church or other established religious
 9.10 organization may import wine exclusively for sacramental purposes without a license.

9.11 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

9.12 Sec. 15. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 340A.404, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

9.13 Subd. 2. **Special provision; city of Minneapolis.** (a) The city of Minneapolis may
 9.14 issue an on-sale intoxicating liquor license to the Guthrie Theater, the Cricket Theatre, the
 9.15 Orpheum Theatre, the State Theatre, and the Historic Pantages Theatre, notwithstanding
 9.16 the limitations of law, or local ordinance, or charter provision relating to zoning or school
 9.17 or church distances. The licenses authorize sales on all days of the week to holders
 9.18 of tickets for performances presented by the theaters and to members of the nonprofit
 9.19 corporations holding the licenses and to their guests.

9.20 (b) The city of Minneapolis may issue an intoxicating liquor license to 510
 9.21 Groveland Associates, a Minnesota cooperative, for use by a restaurant on the premises
 9.22 owned by 510 Groveland Associates, notwithstanding limitations of law, or local
 9.23 ordinance, or charter provision.

9.24 (c) The city of Minneapolis may issue an on-sale intoxicating liquor license to
 9.25 Zuhrah Shrine Temple for use on the premises owned by Zuhrah Shrine Temple at 2540
 9.26 Park Avenue South in Minneapolis, ~~and to the American Swedish Institute for use on~~
 9.27 ~~the premises owned by the American Swedish Institute at 2600 Park Avenue South,~~
 9.28 notwithstanding limitations of law, or local ordinances, or charter provision relating to
 9.29 zoning or school or church distances.

9.30 (d) The city of Minneapolis may issue an on-sale intoxicating liquor license to
 9.31 the American Association of University Women, Minneapolis branch, for use on the
 9.32 premises owned by the American Association of University Women, Minneapolis branch,
 9.33 at 2115 Stevens Avenue South in Minneapolis, notwithstanding limitations of law, or local
 9.34 ordinances, or charter provisions relating to zoning or school or church distances.

10.1 (e) The city of Minneapolis may issue an on-sale wine license and an on-sale 3.2
10.2 percent malt liquor license to a restaurant located at 5000 Penn Avenue South, and an
10.3 on-sale wine license and an on-sale malt liquor license to a restaurant located at 1931
10.4 Nicollet Avenue South, notwithstanding any law or local ordinance or charter provision.

10.5 (f) The city of Minneapolis may issue an on-sale wine license and an on-sale malt
10.6 liquor license to the Brave New Workshop Theatre located at 3001 Hennepin Avenue
10.7 South, the Theatre de la Jeune Lune, the Illusion Theatre located at 528 Hennepin Avenue
10.8 South, the Hollywood Theatre located at 2815 Johnson Street Northeast, the Loring
10.9 Playhouse located at 1633 Hennepin Avenue South, the Jungle Theater located at 2951
10.10 Lyndale Avenue South, Brave New Institute located at 2605 Hennepin Avenue South,
10.11 the Guthrie Lab located at 700 North First Street, and the Southern Theatre located at
10.12 1420 Washington Avenue South, notwithstanding any law or local ordinance or charter
10.13 provision. The license authorizes sales on all days of the week.

10.14 (g) The city of Minneapolis may issue an on-sale intoxicating liquor license to
10.15 University Gateway Corporation, a Minnesota nonprofit corporation, for use by a restaurant
