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relating to agriculture; prohibiting certain rules related to nitrogen fertilizer unless 1.2 approved by law; amending Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 103H.275, subdivision 13 1.4

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 103H.275, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. Areas where groundwater pollution is detected. (a) If groundwater pollution is detected, a state agency or political subdivision that regulates an activity causing or potentially causing a contribution to the pollution identified shall promote implementation of best management practices to prevent or minimize the source of pollution to the extent practicable.

- (b) The Pollution Control Agency, or for agricultural chemicals and practices, the commissioner of agriculture may adopt water source protection requirements under subdivision 2 that are consistent with the goal of section 103H.001 and are commensurate with the groundwater pollution if the implementation of best management practices has proven to be ineffective.
 - (c) The water resources protection requirements must be:
- (1) designed to prevent and minimize the pollution to the extent practicable; 1.18
- (2) designed to prevent the pollution from exceeding the health risk limits; and 1.19
- (3) submitted to the house of representatives and senate committees with jurisdiction 1.20 over the environment, natural resources, and agriculture. 1.21

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- 2.1 (d) The commissioner of agriculture shall not adopt water resource protection
- 2.2 requirements under subdivision 2 for nitrogen fertilizer unless the water resource protection

2.3 requirements are specifically approved by law.
