2.1 Subd. 2. **Permanent bar to set aside a disqualification.** (a) Except as <u>otherwise</u> 2.2 provided in paragraph (b) <u>this subdivision</u>, the commissioner may not set aside the 2.3 disqualification of any individual disqualified pursuant to this chapter, regardless of how 2.4 much time has passed, if the individual was disqualified for a crime or conduct listed in 2.5 section 245C.15, subdivision 1.

(b) For an individual in the chemical dependency or corrections field who was 2.6 disqualified for a crime or conduct listed under section 245C.15, subdivision 1, and whose 2.7 disqualification was set aside prior to July 1, 2005, the commissioner must consider 2.8 granting a variance pursuant to section 245C.30 for the license holder for a program 2.9 dealing primarily with adults. A request for reconsideration evaluated under this paragraph 2.10 must include a letter of recommendation from the license holder that was subject to the 2.11 prior set-aside decision addressing the individual's quality of care to children or vulnerable 2.12 adults and the circumstances of the individual's departure from that service. 2.13

(c) When a licensed foster care provider adopts an individual who had received 2.14 2.15 foster care services from the provider for over six months, and the adopted individual is required to receive a background study under section 245C.03, subdivision 1, paragraph 2.16 (a), clause (2) or (6), the commissioner may grant a variance to the license holder under 2.17 section 245C.30 to permit the adopted individual with a permanent disqualification 2.18 to remain affiliated with the license holder under the conditions of the variance when 2.19 the variance is recommended by the county of responsibility for each of the remaining 2.20 individuals in placement in the home and the licensing agency for the home. 2.21

(d) The commissioner shall consider granting a set aside under section 245C.22 or a
 variance under section 245C.30 to an individual who is now 21 years of age or older and
 who was disqualified for a crime or conduct listed under section 245C.15, subdivision 1,
 occurring while the individual was under the age of 18. This paragraph does not apply to
 individuals who were convicted of the disqualifying crime following certification under
 section 260B.125.

Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2008, section 260B.157, subdivision 1, is amended to read:
Subdivision 1. Investigation. Upon request of the court the local social services
agency or probation officer shall investigate the personal and family history and
environment of any minor coming within the jurisdiction of the court under section
260B.101 and shall report its findings to the court. The court may order any minor coming
within its jurisdiction to be examined by a duly qualified physician, psychiatrist, or
psychologist appointed by the court.

The court shall order a chemical use assessment conducted when a child is (1) found 3.1 to be delinquent for violating a provision of chapter 152, or for committing a felony-level 3.2 violation of a provision of chapter 609 if the probation officer determines that alcohol or 3.3 drug use was a contributing factor in the commission of the offense, or (2) alleged to be 3.4 delinquent for violating a provision of chapter 152, if the child is being held in custody 3.5 under a detention order. The assessor's qualifications and the assessment criteria shall 3.6 comply with Minnesota Rules, parts 9530.6600 to 9530.6655. If funds under chapter 3.7 254B are to be used to pay for the recommended treatment, the assessment and placement 3.8 must comply with all provisions of Minnesota Rules, parts 9530.6600 to 9530.6655 and 3.9 9530.7000 to 9530.7030. The commissioner of human services shall reimburse the court 3.10 for the cost of the chemical use assessment, up to a maximum of \$100. 3.11

The court shall order a children's mental health screening and a chemical use 3.12 screening conducted when a child is found to be delinquent. The screening shall be 3.13 conducted with a screening instrument approved by the commissioner of human services 3.14 and shall be conducted by a mental health practitioner as defined in section 245.4871, 3.15 subdivision 26, or a probation officer who is trained in the use of the screening instrument. 3.16 If the approved instrument includes screening for mental health and chemical use, a single 3.17 screening fulfills both requirements. If the screening indicates a need for a mental health 3.18 assessment, the local social services agency, in consultation with the child's family, shall 3.19 have a diagnostic assessment conducted, including a functional assessment, as defined 3.20 in section 245.4871. If the screening indicates a need for a chemical use assessment, 3.21 a referral must be made, in consultation with the child's family, for a chemical use 3.22 3.23 assessment, as defined in section 254A.03, subdivision 3.

With the consent of the commissioner of corrections and agreement of the county to 3.24 pay the costs thereof, the court may, by order, place a minor coming within its jurisdiction 3.25 in an institution maintained by the commissioner for the detention, diagnosis, custody and 3.26 treatment of persons adjudicated to be delinquent, in order that the condition of the minor 3.27 be given due consideration in the disposition of the case. Any funds received under the 3.28 provisions of this subdivision shall not cancel until the end of the fiscal year immediately 3.29 following the fiscal year in which the funds were received.
