1.6	Section 1. PUBLIC POLICY STATEMENT.
1.7	The public policy of this state is to:
1.8	(1) ensure that each child has frequent and substantial contact with the child's parents,
1.9	as long as the child's parents have shown the ability to act in the best interests of the child;
1.10	(2) ensure that parents and caregivers provide a safe and nurturing environment for each
1.11	child; and
1.12	(3) encourage parents to share the rights and duties of raising their child.

1.14	257.025 CUSTODY AND PARENTING TIME DISPUTES.
1.15	(a) In any custody or parenting time proceeding involving unmarried parents, the court

1.18	(b) The fact that the parents of the child are not or were never married to each other shall
1.19	not be determinative of the custody and parenting time of the child.

4.12 Subdivision 1. Best interests of the child. (a) In evaluating the best interests of the child
4.13 for purposes of determining issues of custody and parenting time, the court must consider
4.14 and evaluate all relevant factors, including:

4.15 (1) a child's physical, emotional, cultural, spiritual, and other needs, and the effect of
4.16 the proposed arrangements on the child's needs and development;

4.17 (2) any special medical, mental health, or educational needs that the child may have that
4.18 may require special parenting arrangements or access to recommended services;

4.19 (3) the reasonable preference of the child, if the court deems the child to be of sufficient
4.20 ability, age, and maturity to express an independent, reliable preference;

4.21 (4) whether domestic abuse, as defined in section 518B.01, has occurred in the parents'
4.22 or either parent's household or relationship; the nature and context of the domestic abuse;
4.23 and the implications of the domestic abuse for parenting and for the child's safety, well-being,
4.24 and developmental needs;

4.25 (5) any physical, mental, or chemical health issue of a parent that affects the child's
4.26 safety or developmental needs;

4.27 (6) the history and nature of each parent's participation in providing care for the child;

4.28 (7) the willingness and ability of each parent to provide ongoing care for the child; to
4.29 meet the child's ongoing developmental, emotional, spiritual, and cultural needs; and to
4.30 maintain consistency and follow through with parenting time;

4.31 (8) the effect on the child's well-being and development of changes to home, school,4.32 and community;

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5.1	(9) the effect of the proposed arrangements on the ongoing relationships between the
5.2	child and each parent, siblings, and other significant persons in the child's life;
5.3	(10) the benefit to the child in maximizing parenting time with both parents and the
5.4	detriment to the child in limiting parenting time with either parent;

5.15	(1) The court must make detailed findings on each of the factors in paragraph (a) based
5.16	on the evidence presented and explain how each factor led to its conclusions and to the
5.17	determination of custody and parenting time. The court may not use one factor to the
5.18	exclusion of all others, and the court shall consider that the factors may be interrelated.
5.19	(2) The court shall consider that it is in the best interests of the child to promote the
5.20	child's healthy growth and development through safe, stable, nurturing relationships between
5.21	a child and both parents. In determining custody, the court must consider the best interests
5.22	of each child and must not prefer one parent over the other solely on the basis of the gender
5.23	of the parent.
5.24	(3) The court shall consider both parents as having the capacity to develop and sustain
5.25	nurturing relationships with their children unless there are substantial reasons to believe
5.26	otherwise. In assessing whether parents are capable of sustaining nurturing relationships
5.27	with their children, the court shall recognize that there are many ways that parents can
5.28	respond to a child's needs with sensitivity and provide the child love and guidance, and
5.29	these may differ between parents and among cultures.
5.30	(4) The court shall not consider conduct of a party that does not affect the party's
5.31	relationship with the child.
5.32	(5) Disability alone, as defined in section 363A.03, of a proposed custodian or the child

5.33 shall not be determinative of the custody of the child.

6.1 (6) The court shall consider evidence of a violation of section 609.507 in determining
6.2 the best interests of the child.

6.3 (7) There is no presumption for or against joint physical custody, except as provided in
6.4 clause (9).

6.5 (8) Joint physical custody does not require an absolutely equal division of time.

(9) The court shall use a rebuttable presumption that upon request of either or both 6.6 parties, joint legal custody is in the best interests of the child. However, the court shall use 6.7 a rebuttable presumption that joint legal custody or joint physical custody is not in the best 6.8 interests of the child if domestic abuse, as defined in section 518B.01, has occurred between 6.9 the parents. In determining whether the presumption is rebutted, the court shall consider 6.10 the nature and context of the domestic abuse and the implications of the domestic abuse for 6.11 parenting and for the child's safety, well-being, and developmental needs. Disagreement 6.12 alone over whether to grant sole or joint custody does not constitute an inability of parents 6.13 to cooperate in the rearing of their children as referenced in paragraph (a), clause (12). 6.14

6.15 (c) In a proceeding involving the custodial responsibility of a service member's child, a
6.16 court may not consider only a parent's past deployment or possible future deployment in
6.17 determining the best interests of the child. For purposes of this paragraph, "custodial
6.18 responsibility" has the meaning given in section 518E.102, paragraph (f).

6.19 Sec. 7. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 518.17, subdivision 3, is amended to read:

6.20 Subd. 3. Custody order. (a) Upon adjudging the nullity of a marriage, or in a dissolution
6.21 or separation proceeding, or in a child custody proceeding, the court shall make such further
6.22 order as it deems just and proper concerning:

6.23 (1) the legal custody of the minor children of the parties which that shall be sole or joint;

6.24 (2) their physical custody, parenting time, and residence; and

6.25 (3) their support. In determining custody, the court shall consider the best interests of
6.26 each child and shall not prefer one parent over the other solely on the basis of the sex of the
6.27 parent.

(b) The court shall grant the rights listed in subdivision 3a to each of the parties, regardless
of custodial designation, unless specific findings are made under section 518.68, subdivision
1. The court shall include in the custody order the notice under subdivision 3a.

6.31 (c) The court may waive any of the rights under this section if it finds it is necessary to6.32 protect the welfare of a party or child.

(d) If a court order or law prohibits contact by a party, the notifications and information
required to be sent under subdivision 3a, clauses (1), (2), (3), (5), and (6), shall not be made
by direct communication of the parties. Third-party communication shall be limited to the
specific purposes delineated in this subdivision or subdivision 3a. Nothing in this subdivision
or subdivision 3a shall modify, suspend, revoke, or terminate a court order or law that
prohibits contact by a party.

(e) If one of the parties is a program participant under chapter 5B, the other party shall
send all information and notifications required under subdivision 3a, clauses (1), (2), (3),
(5), and (6), to the participant's designated address. The program participant is exempted
from the requirements of subdivision 3a.

(f) Failure to notify or inform a party of rights under subdivision 3a does not form a
basis for modification under section 518.18, paragraph (d), clause (iv), unless other grounds
are alleged which would support a modification.

Subdivision 1. General. (a) In all proceedings for dissolution or legal separation, 7.15 subsequent to the commencement of the proceeding and continuing thereafter during the 7.16 minority of the child, the court shall, upon the request of either parent, grant such parenting 7.17 time on behalf of the child and a parent as will enable the child and the parent to maintain 7.18 a child to parent relationship that will be in the best interests of the child. The court, when 7.19 issuing a parenting time order, may reserve a determination as to the future establishment 7.20 or expansion of a parent's parenting time. In that event, the best interest standard set forth 7.21 in subdivision 5, paragraph (a), shall be applied to a subsequent motion to establish or 7.22 expand parenting time. 7.23

(b) If the court finds, after a hearing, that parenting time with a parent is likely to endanger
the child's physical, mental, or emotional health or safety or impair the child's emotional
development, the court shall restrict parenting time with that parent as to time, place, duration,
or supervision and may deny parenting time entirely, as the circumstances warrant. The
court shall consider the age of the child and the child's relationship with the parent prior to
the commencement of the proceeding.

(c) A parent's failure to pay support because of the parent's inability to do so shall not
be sufficient cause for denial of parenting time.

(d) The court may provide that a law enforcement officer or other appropriate personwill accompany a party seeking to enforce or comply with parenting time.

8.1	(e) Upon request of either party, to the extent practicable an order for parenting time
8.2	must include a specific schedule for regular parenting time, including the frequency and
8.3	duration of visitation parenting time and visitation parenting time during holidays and,
8.4	vacations, and school breaks unless parenting time is restricted, denied, or reserved.

(f) The court administrator shall provide a form for a pro se motion regarding parenting
time disputes, which includes provisions for indicating the relief requested, an affidavit in
which the party may state the facts of the dispute, and a brief description of the parenting
time expeditor process under section 518.1751. The form may not include a request for a
change of custody. The court shall provide instructions on serving and filing the motion.

8.10 (g) In the absence of other evidence, there is a rebuttable presumption that a parent is entitled to child must receive a minimum of at least 25 percent of the parenting time for the 8.11 child with each parent. For purposes of this paragraph, the percentage of parenting time 8.12 may be determined by calculating the number of overnights that a child spends with a parent 8.13 or by using a method other than overnights if the parent has significant time periods on 8.14 separate days when the child is in the parent's physical custody but does not stay overnight. 8.15 The court may consider the age of the child in determining whether a child is with a parent 8.16 for a significant period of time. 8.17

8.19 Subd. 6. Remedies. (a) Each party must follow a court's order for custody and parenting
8.20 time unless the parties have made another agreement in writing.

8.21 (b) For the purposes of this subdivision, "court-ordered parenting time" means:

8.22 (1) parenting time that a court has ordered, regardless of whether the order is temporary

8.23 or permanent and whether the family court or juvenile court has issued the order;

8.24 (2) an order by a parenting time consultant, parenting coordinator, special master, or

8.25 other court-appointed individual who is authorized to establish or modify parenting time;

8.26 <u>or</u>

8.27 (3) a binding agreement or decision under section 518.1751, subdivision 3.

(a) (c) The court may must provide compensatory parenting time when a parent has
intentionally made a substantial amount of court-ordered parenting time has been made
unavailable to one the other parent unless providing the compensatory parenting time is not
consistent with the child's best interests. The court must consider all relevant evidence to
determine whether a parent has made a substantial amount of court-ordered parenting time
unavailable to the other parent.

9.24	(2) require the party to post a bond with the court for a specified period of time to secure
9.25	the party's compliance;
9.26	(3) award reasonable attorney's fees and costs;
9.27	(4) require the party who violated the parenting time order or binding agreement or
9.28	decision of the parenting time expeditor to reimburse the other party for costs incurred as
9.29	a result of the violation of the order or agreement or decision; or
9.30	(5) (3) award any other remedy that the court finds to be in the best interests of the
9.31	children involved.

10.1 A civil penalty imposed under this paragraph must be deposited in the county general
 10.2 fund and must be used to fund the costs of a parenting time expeditor program in a county
 10.3 with this program. In other counties, the civil penalty must be deposited in the state general
 10.4 fund.

10.5 (e) (f) The court shall provide one or more of the remedies available in paragraph (d),
 10.6 clauses (1) to (5) and (2), if one of the following occurs:

(1) the court finds that a party has repeatedly and intentionally denied or interfered with
 court-ordered parenting time after a previous finding that the party repeatedly and
 intentionally denied or interfered with court-ordered parenting time; or.

10.10 (2) the court finds that a party has failed to comply with a binding agreement or decision
 10.11 under section 518.1751 after a previous finding that the party failed to comply with a binding
 10.12 agreement or decision under section 518.1751.

(f) (g) If the court makes written findings that any denial of or interference with
 court-ordered parenting time or the failure to comply with a binding agreement or decision
 under section 518.1751 was necessary to protect a child's physical or emotional health, the
 court is not required to comply with paragraphs (b) to (e).

10.17  $(\underline{g})(\underline{h})$  If the court finds that a party has been denied parenting time and has incurred 10.18 expenses in connection with the denied parenting time, the court may require the party who 10.19 denied parenting time to post a bond in favor of the other party in the amount of prepaid 10.20 expenses associated with upcoming planned parenting time.

10.21 (h)(i) Proof of an unwarranted denial of or interference with duly established parenting 10.22 time may constitute contempt of court and may be sufficient cause for reversal of custody.

10.23 (i) (j) All parenting time orders must include notice of the provisions of this subdivision.

10.24 (k) The required notice under paragraph (i) must be substantially as follows:
