1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. APPROPRIATIONS; DEPARTMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND
1.8	ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CHILD CARE BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT.
1.9	Subdivision 1. Grants for child care. (a) \$10,000,000 in fiscal year 2022 is appropriated
1.10	from the general fund to the commissioner of employment and economic development for
1.11	grants to local communities to increase the number of quality child care providers. This is
1.12	a onetime appropriation. Fifty percent of grant funds must go to communities located outside
1.13	of the seven-county metropolitan area as defined under Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121,
1.14	subdivision 2.
1.15	(b) Grant recipients must obtain a 50 percent nonstate match to grant funds through
1.16	either cash or in-kind contributions. Grant funds available under this subdivision must be
1.17	used to implement projects to reduce the child care shortage in the state, including but not
1.18	limited to funding for child care business start-ups or expansion, training, facility
1.19	modifications or improvements required for licensing, and assistance with licensing and
1.20	other regulatory requirements. In awarding grants, the commissioner must give priority to
1.21	communities that have demonstrated a shortage of child care providers.
1.22	(c) Within one year of receiving grant funds, grant recipients must report to the
1.23	commissioner on the outcomes of the grant program, including but not limited to the number
