1.8	(b) "Authorized local education agency user" means a teacher or other person who is:
1.9	(1) employed by a school that provides instruction to a student; and
1.10	(2) authorized to access data in a student achievement backpack.

3.4	Subd. 3. Minnesota Student Record Center. (a) The commissioner must establish a
3.5	Minnesota Student Record Center using existing information collected and used by the
3.6	Statewide Longitudinal Education Data System.
3.7	(b) The Minnesota Student Record Center may, upon parental authorization, allow an
3.8	authorized local education agency user to:
3.9	(1) access data in a student achievement backpack relevant to the user's school; or
3.10	(2) request student records be transferred from one school to another.
3.11	(c) The commissioner must implement security measures to ensure that student data
3.12	stored or transmitted to or from the Minnesota Student Record Center is secure and
3.13	confidential pursuant to state and federal requirements and that an authorized local education
3.14	agency user may only access student data that is relevant to the user's local education agency
3.15	or school.
3.16	(d) A student's parent or guardian may request the student achievement backpack from
3.17	the local education agency or school in which the student is enrolled. School districts must
3.18	provide a parent or guardian with an electronic copy of the student's educational record
3.19	upon request.
3.20	(e) The commissioner must develop policies for school districts that:
3.21	(1) ensure student data is provided only to the authorized individuals;
3.22	(2) ensure that school districts have a plan to allow parents and guardians to securely
3.23	view online, download, and transmit data specific to their child's educational record;
3.24	(3) annually notify parents and guardians of their right to request their child's student
3.25	records;
3.26	(4) ensure student records are securely shared with parents and guardians;
3.27	(5) detail the time frame within which student record requests must be provided; and
3.28	(6) ensure the information provided in this section will be available via a secure online
3.29	portal and via hard copy upon request.
3.30	Subd. 4. Data accessibility. (a) No later than June 30, 2020, an authorized local education
3.31	agency user shall be able to access student data in a student achievement backpack, which

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4.1	shall include the following data or request the data be transferred from one local education
4.2	agency to another:
4.3	(1) student demographics;
4.4	(2) course grades;
4.5	(3) course history; and
4.6	(4) results for state-mandated assessments.
4.7	(b) No later than June 30, 2021, an authorized local education agency user shall be able
4.8	to access student data in a student achievement backpack, which shall include the data listed
4.9	in paragraph (a), clauses (1) to (4), and the following data, or request the data be transferred
4.10	from one local education agency to another:
4.11	(1) attendance records;
4.12	(2) the name of a student's teacher for classes or courses the student takes and the teacher's
4.13	qualifications, including years of experience, degree, license, and endorsement;
4.14	(3) results of formative, interim, and summative computer adaptive assessments;
4.15	(4) detailed data demonstrating a student's mastery of state academic standards;
4.16	(5) for students in grade 8 or higher, results from career and college readiness
4.17	assessments;
4.18	(6) for students in kindergarten through grade 2, reading proficiency level according to
4.19	section 120B.12; and
4.20	(7) federal free or reduced-price lunch program eligibility.
4.21	(c) No later than June 30, 2020, the commissioner must ensure that data collected in the
4.22	Minnesota Student Record Center for a student achievement backpack are integrated into
4.23	each local education agency student information system and shall be made available to a
4.24	student's parent or guardian and an authorized local education agency user in an easily
4.25	accessible viewing format. The commissioner must engage stakeholders, including parents
4.26	and principals, to ensure that the information meets their needs, is easy to find on the state
4.27	website, and is easy to understand for a parent who does not have a high school diploma.
