## 1.6 (a) An agreement between parties that purports to release, limit, or waive the liability

- 1.11 (2) disability for 60 days or more; or

#### 1.12 (3) death.

- 1.13 The agreement is severable from a waiver of liability for injuries resulting from the risk
- 1.14 inherent in a particular activity or for injuries not described in clauses (1) to (3).

# 1.15 (b) This section does not prevent a court from finding that an agreement is void and

- 1.16 <u>unenforceable as against public policy on other grounds or under other law.</u>
- 1.17 (c) For purposes of this section, "party" or "parties" includes a person, agent, servant
- 1.18 or employee of that party or parties, and includes a minor or another who is authorized to
- 1.19 sign or accept the agreement on behalf of the minor. "Disability" means the inability to
- 1.20 engage in substantially all of the injured person's usual and customary daily activities.

# 1.21 EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective August 1, 2013, and applies to 1.22 agreements first signed or accepted on or after that date.
