1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. [144.6502] ELECTRONIC MONITORING IN CERTAIN HEALTH CARE
1.7	FACILITIES.
1.8	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) For the purposes of this section, the terms defined in this
1.9	subdivision have the meanings given.
1.10	(b) "Electronic monitoring" means the placement and use of an electronic monitoring
1.11	device by a resident in the resident's room or private living unit in accordance with this
1.12	section.
1.13	(c) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of health.
1.14	(d) "Department" means the Department of Health.
1.15	(e) "Electronic monitoring device" means a camera or other device that captures, records,
1.16	or broadcasts audio, video, or both, that is placed in a resident's room or private living unit
1.17	and is used to monitor the resident or activities in the room or private living unit.
1.18	(f) "Facility" means a nursing home licensed under chapter 144A, a boarding care home
1 10	licensed under sections 144 50 to 144 56, or a housing with services establishment registered

under chapter 144D that is either subject to chapter 144G or has a disclosed special unit

(g) "Resident" means a person 18 years of age or older residing in a facility.

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(h) "Resident representative" means one of the following in the order of priority listed, 2.1 to the extent the person may reasonably be identified and located: 2.2 (1) a court-appointed guardian; 2.3 (2) a health care agent under section 145C.01, subdivision 2; or 2.4 (3) a person who is not an agent of a facility or of a home care provider designated in 2.5 writing by the resident and maintained in the resident's records on file with the facility or 2.6 with the resident's executed housing with services contract. 2.7 Subd. 2. Electronic monitoring. (a) A resident or a resident representative may conduct 2.8 electronic monitoring of the resident's room or private living unit through the use of electronic 2.9 monitoring devices placed in the resident's room or private living unit as provided in this 2.10 section. 2.11 (b) Nothing in this section precludes the use of electronic monitoring of health care 2.12 allowed under other law. 2.13 2.14 (c) Electronic monitoring authorized under this section is not a covered service under home and community-based waivers under sections 256B.0913, 256B.0915, 256B.092, and 2.15 256B.49. 2.16 (d) This section does not apply to monitoring technology authorized as a home and 2.17 community-based service under section 256B.0913, 256B.0915, 256B.092, or 256B.49. 2.18 Subd. 3. Consent to electronic monitoring. (a) Except as otherwise provided in this 2.19 subdivision, a resident must consent to electronic monitoring in the resident's room or private 2.20 living unit in writing on a notification and consent form. If the resident has not affirmatively 2.21 objected to electronic monitoring and the resident's medical professional determines that 2.22 the resident currently lacks the ability to understand and appreciate the nature and 2.23 consequences of electronic monitoring, the resident representative may consent on behalf 2.24 of the resident. For purposes of this subdivision, a resident affirmatively objects when the 2.25 resident orally, visually, or through the use of auxiliary aids or services declines electronic 2.26 2.27 monitoring. The resident's response must be documented on the notification and consent form. 2.28 2.29 (b) Prior to a resident representative consenting on behalf of a resident, the resident must be asked if the resident wants electronic monitoring to be conducted. The resident 2.30 2.31 representative must explain to the resident: (1) the type of electronic monitoring device to be used; 2.32

(2) the standard conditions that may be placed on the electronic monitoring device's use, including those listed in subdivision 6;

- (3) with whom the recording may be shared under subdivision 10 or 11; and
- (4) the resident's ability to decline all recording.

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- (c) A resident, or resident representative when consenting on behalf of the resident, may consent to electronic monitoring with any conditions of the resident's or resident representative's choosing, including the list of standard conditions provided in subdivision 6. A resident, or resident representative when consenting on behalf of the resident, may request that the electronic monitoring device be turned off or the visual or audio recording component of the electronic monitoring device be blocked at any time.
- (d) Prior to implementing electronic monitoring, a resident, or resident representative when acting on behalf of the resident, must obtain the written consent on the notification and consent form of any other resident residing in the shared room or shared private living unit. A roommate's or roommate's resident representative's written consent must comply with the requirements of paragraphs (a) to (c). Consent by a roommate or a roommate's resident representative under this paragraph authorizes the resident's use of any recording obtained under this section, as provided under subdivision 10 or 11.
- (e) Any resident conducting electronic monitoring must immediately remove or disable an electronic monitoring device prior to a new roommate moving into a shared room or shared private living unit, unless the resident obtains the roommate's or roommate's resident representative's written consent as provided under paragraph (d) prior to the roommate moving into the shared room or shared private living unit. Upon obtaining the new roommate's signed notification and consent form and submitting the form to the facility as required under subdivision 5, the resident may resume electronic monitoring.
- (f) The resident or roommate, or the resident representative or roommate's resident representative if the representative is consenting on behalf of the resident or roommate, may withdraw consent at any time and the withdrawal of consent must be documented on the original consent form as provided under subdivision 5, paragraph (c).
- Subd. 4. Refusal of roommate to consent. If a resident of a facility who is residing in a shared room or shared living unit, or the resident representative of such a resident when acting on behalf of the resident, wants to conduct electronic monitoring and another resident living in or moving into the same shared room or shared living unit refuses to consent to the use of an electronic monitoring device, the facility shall make a reasonable attempt to accommodate the resident who wants to conduct electronic monitoring. A facility has met

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the requirement to make a reasonable attempt to accommodate a resident or resident representative who wants to conduct electronic monitoring when, upon notification that a roommate has not consented to the use of an electronic monitoring device in the resident's room, the facility offers to move the resident to another shared room or shared living unit that is available at the time of the request. If a resident chooses to reside in a private room or private living unit in a facility in order to accommodate the use of an electronic monitoring device, the resident must pay either the private room rate in a nursing home setting, or the applicable rent in a housing with services establishment. If a facility is unable to accommodate a resident due to lack of space, the facility must reevaluate the request every two weeks until the request is fulfilled. A facility is not required to provide a private room, a single-bed room, or a private living unit to a resident who is unable to pay.

- Subd. 5. Notice to facility. (a) Electronic monitoring may begin only after the resident or resident representative who intends to place an electronic monitoring device and any roommate or roommate's resident representative completes the notification and consent form and submits the form to the facility.
- (b) Upon receipt of any completed notification and consent form, the facility must place the original form in the resident's file or file the original form with the resident's housing with services contract. The facility must provide a copy to the resident and the resident's roommate, if applicable.
- (c) In the event that a resident or roommate, or the resident representative or roommate's resident representative if the representative is consenting on behalf of the resident or roommate, chooses to alter the conditions under which consent to electronic monitoring is given or chooses to withdraw consent to electronic monitoring, the facility must make available the original notification and consent form so that it may be updated. Upon receipt of the updated form, the facility must place the updated form in the resident's file or file the original form with the resident's signed housing with services contract. The facility must provide a copy of the updated form to the resident and the resident's roommate, if applicable.
- (d) If a new roommate, or the new roommate's resident representative when consenting on behalf of the new roommate, does not submit to the facility a completed notification and consent form and the resident conducting the electronic monitoring does not remove or disable the electronic monitoring device, the facility must remove the electronic monitoring device.
- (e) If a roommate, or the roommate's resident representative when withdrawing consent on behalf of the roommate, submits an updated notification and consent form withdrawing

(2) the resident's roommate's signed consent or the signature of the roommate's resident

representative, if applicable. If a roommate's resident representative signs the consent form,

and consent form on the resident's behalf;

the form must document the following:

6.1	(i) the date the roommate was asked if the roommate wants electronic monitoring to be

6.3	(ii) who was present when the roommate was asked;
6.4	(iii) an acknowledgment that the roommate did not affirmatively object; and
6.5	(iv) the source of authority allowing the resident representative to sign the notification
6.6	and consent form on the resident's behalf;
6.7	(3) the type of electronic monitoring device to be used;
6.8	(4) a list of standard conditions or restrictions that the resident or a roommate may elect
6.9	to place on the use of the electronic monitoring device, including but not limited to:
6.10	(i) prohibiting audio recording;
6.11	(ii) prohibiting video recording;
6.12	(iii) prohibiting broadcasting of audio or video;
6.13	(iv) turning off the electronic monitoring device or blocking the visual recording
6.14	component of the electronic monitoring device for the duration of an exam or procedure by
6.15	a health care professional;
6.16	(v) turning off the electronic monitoring device or blocking the visual recording
6.17	component of the electronic monitoring device while dressing or bathing is performed; and
6.18	(vi) turning off the electronic monitoring device for the duration of a visit with a spiritual
6.19	adviser, ombudsman, attorney, financial planner, intimate partner, or other visitor;
6.20	(5) any other condition or restriction elected by the resident or roommate on the use of
6.21	an electronic monitoring device;
6.22	(6) a statement of the circumstances under which a recording may be disseminated under
6.23	subdivision 10;
6.24	(7) a signature box for documenting that the resident or roommate has withdrawn consent;
6.25	<u>and</u>
6.26	(8) an acknowledgment that the resident, in accordance with subdivision 3, consents,
6.27	authorizes, and allows the Office of Ombudsman for Long-Term Care and representatives
6.28	of its office to disclose information about the form limited to:
6.29	(i) the fact that the form was received from the resident or resident representative;

7.1	(ii) if signed by a resident representative, the name of the resident representative and
7.2	the source of authority allowing the resident representative to sign the notification and
7.3	consent form on the resident's behalf; and
7.4	(iii) the type of electronic monitoring device placed.
7.5	(b) Facilities must make the notification and consent form available to the residents and
7.6	inform residents of their option to conduct electronic monitoring of their rooms or private
7.7	living unit.
7.8	(c) Notification and consent forms received by the Office of Ombudsman for Long-Term
7.9	Care are data protected under section 256.9744.
7.10	Subd. 7. Cost and installation. (a) A resident choosing to conduct electronic monitoring
7.11	must do so at the resident's own expense, including paying purchase, installation,
7.12	maintenance, and removal costs.
7.13	(b) If a resident chooses to place an electronic monitoring device that uses Internet
7.14	technology for visual or audio monitoring, the resident may be responsible for contracting
7.15	with an Internet service provider.
7.16	(c) The facility shall make a reasonable attempt to accommodate the resident's installation
7.17	needs, including allowing access to the facility's public-use Internet or Wi-Fi systems when
7.18	available for other public uses.
7.19	(d) All electronic monitoring device installations and supporting services must be
7.20	<u>UL-listed.</u>
7.21	Subd. 8. Notice to visitors. (a) A facility shall post a sign at each facility entrance
7.22	accessible to visitors that states "Security cameras and audio devices may be present to
7.23	record persons and activities."
7.24	(b) The facility is responsible for installing and maintaining the signage required in this
7.25	subdivision.
7.26	Subd. 9. Obstruction of electronic monitoring devices. (a) A person must not knowingly
7.27	hamper, obstruct, tamper with, or destroy an electronic monitoring device placed in a
7.28	resident's room or private living unit without the permission of the resident or resident
7.29	representative.
7.30	(b) It is not a violation of paragraph (a) if a person turns off the electronic monitoring
7.31	device or blocks the visual recording component of the electronic monitoring device at the
7.32	direction of the resident or resident representative, or if consent has been withdrawn.

Subd. 10. Dissemination of recordings. (a) No person may access any video or audio 8.1 recording created through authorized electronic monitoring without the written consent of 8.2 8.3 the resident or resident representative. (b) Except as required under other law, a recording or copy of a recording made as 8.4 8.5 provided in this section may only be disseminated for the purpose of addressing health, safety, or welfare concerns of a resident or residents. 8.6 (c) A person disseminating a recording or copy of a recording made as provided in this 8 7 section in violation of paragraph (b) may be civilly or criminally liable. 8.8 Subd. 11. Admissibility of evidence. Subject to applicable rules of evidence and 8.9 procedure, any video or audio recording created through electronic monitoring under this 8.10 section may be admitted into evidence in a civil, criminal, or administrative proceeding. 8.11 8.12 Subd. 12. Liability. (a) For the purposes of state law, the mere presence of an electronic monitoring device in a resident's room or private living unit is not a violation of the resident's 8.13 right to privacy under section 144.651 or 144A.44. 8.14 (b) For the purposes of state law, a facility or home care provider is not civilly or 8.15 8.16 criminally liable for the mere disclosure by a resident or a resident representative of a 8.17 recording. Subd. 13. Immunity from liability. The Office of Ombudsman for Long-Term Care 8.18 and representatives of the office are immune from liability as provided under section 8.19 256.9742, subdivision 2. 8.20 Subd. 14. **Resident protections.** (a) A facility must not: 8.21 (1) refuse to admit a potential resident or remove a resident because the facility disagrees 8.22 with the potential resident's or the resident's decisions regarding electronic monitoring, 8.23 including when the decision is made by a resident representative acting on behalf of the 8.24 8.25 resident; (2) retaliate or discriminate against any resident for consenting or refusing to consent 8.26 to electronic monitoring; or 8.27 (3) prevent the placement or use of an electronic monitoring device by a resident who 8.28 has provided the facility or the Office of the Ombudsman for Long-Term Care with notice 8.29 and consent as required under this section. 8.30 8.31 (b) Any contractual provision prohibiting, limiting, or otherwise modifying the rights and obligations in this section is contrary to public policy and is void and unenforceable. 8.32

9.1	Subd. 15. Employee discipline. An employee of the facility or of a contractor providing
9.2	services at the facility, including an arranged home care provider as defined in section
9.3	144D.01, subdivision 2a, who is the subject of proposed corrective or disciplinary action
9.4	based upon evidence obtained by electronic monitoring must be given access to that evidence
9.5	for purposes of defending against the proposed action. The recording or a copy of the
9.6	recording must be treated confidentially by the employee and must not be further
9.7	disseminated to any other person except as required under law. Any copy of the recording
9.8	must be returned to the facility or resident who provided the copy when it is no longer
9.9	needed for purposes of defending against a proposed action.
9.10	Subd. 16. Penalties. (a) The commissioner may issue a correction order as provided
9.11	under section 144A.10, 144A.45, or 144A.474, upon a finding that the facility has failed to
9.12	comply with subdivision 5, paragraphs (b) to (e); 6, paragraph (b); 7, paragraph (c); 8; 9;
9.13	10; or 14. For each violation of this section, the commissioner may impose a fine up to \$500
9.14	upon a finding of noncompliance with a correction order issued according to this subdivision.
9.15	(b) The commissioner may exercise the commissioner's authority provided under section
9.16	144D.05 to compel a housing with services establishment to meet the requirements of this
9.17	section.
9.18	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective January 1, 2020, and applies to all
9.19	agreements in effect, entered into, or renewed on or after that date.
9.20	Sec. 2. TRANSITION TO AUTHORIZED ELECTRONIC MONITORING IN
9.20	CERTAIN HEALTH CARE FACILITIES.
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9.22	Any resident, resident representative, or other person conducting electronic monitoring
9.23	in a resident's room or private living unit prior to January 1, 2020, must comply with the
9.24	requirements of Minnesota Statutes, section 144.6502, by January 1, 2020.
9.25	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
9.26	Sec. 3. DIRECTION TO THE COMMISSIONER OF HEALTH.
9.20	Sec. 5. DIRECTION TO THE COMMISSIONER OF HEALTH.
9.27	The commissioner of health shall prescribe the notification and consent form described
9.28	in Minnesota Statutes, section 144.6502, subdivision 6, no later than January 1, 2020. The
9.29	commissioner shall make the form available on the department's website.
9.30	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
