6.18	not limited to, an expansion of programs to
6.19	provide experience in different crafts to youth
6.20	and young adults throughout the state;
6.21	(2) increase the number of high schools in
6.22	Minnesota offering construction classes during
6.23	the academic year that utilize a multicraft
6.24	<u>curriculum;</u>
6.25	(3) increase the number of summer internship
6.26	opportunities;

7.17	engagement, risk prevention, and intervention
7.18	activities that help build the resiliency of the
7.19	Somali-Minnesotan community and address
7.20	challenges facing Somali youth. Of this
7.21	amount, \$1,000,000 is for a grant to
7.22	Youthprise for activities provided in this
7.23	paragraph. Funded projects must provide
7.24	culturally and linguistically relevant services.
7.25	To the maximum extent possible, 50 percent
7.26	of the funding must be distributed in greater
7.27	Minnesota, and 50 percent of the funding must
7.28	be distributed within the metropolitan area, as
7.29	defined in Minnesota Statutes, section
7.30	473.121, subdivision 2. Of the amount
7.31	appropriated for grants to be awarded by the
7.32	commissioner, up to five percent is for
7.33	administration and monitoring of the program.
7.34	This is a onetime appropriation and is
7.35	available until June 30, 2022.
