1.4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.5	Section 1. GRANTS TO EXPAND ACCESS TO CHILD CARE FOR CHILDREN
1.6	WITH DISABILITIES.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The commissioner of human services must establish
1.8	competitive grants to expand access to licensed family child care providers or licensed child
1.9	care centers for children with disabilities including medical complexities. Grants must be
1.10	awarded to counties or tribes and must be used to assist family child care providers or child
1.11	care centers to serve children with disabilities in inclusive settings alongside children without
1.12	disabilities. Competitive grants must be awarded to at least two applicants beginning no
1.13	later than December 1, 2020.
1.14	Subd. 2. Commissioner's duties. To implement these grants, the commissioner must:
1.15	(1) develop a request for proposals with stakeholder input;
1.16	(2) develop procedures for data collection, qualitative and quantitative measurement of
1.17	programmatic outcomes, and reporting requirements for grantees;
1.18	(3) convene a working group of grantees, grantee partners, and participating families to
1.19	assess progress on grant activities, share best practices, and collect and review data on grant
1.20	activities; and
1.21	(4) based on information gathered throughout the grant period and at the conclusion of
1.22	the grant period, provide a report to the chairs and ranking minorities members of the

2.4	Subd. 3. Grant activities. Grantees must use grant funds to expand access to inclusive
2.5	family child care providers or child care centers to children with disabilities, which may
2.6	include:
2.7	(1) onetime needs to equip a child care setting to serve children with disabilities, such
2.8	<u>as:</u>
2.9	(i) environmental modifications;
2.10	(ii) accessibility modifications;
2.11	(iii) sensory adaptation;
2.12	(iv) training and staff time for training; or
2.13	(v) equipment purchase;
2.14	(2) ongoing medical or disability-related services for children with disabilities in inclusive
2.15	child care settings, such as:
2.16	(i) mental health supports;
2.17	(ii) inclusion specialist services;
2.18	(iii) home care nursing;
2.19	(iv) behavioral supports;

4.2	\$250,000 is appropriated from the general fund in fiscal year 2021 to the commissioner
4.3	of human services for the child care expansion grants in section 1. The commissioner may
4.4	use up to seven percent of the appropriation for administration and technical assistance.
4.5	The base appropriation is \$250,000 for each of fiscal years 2022 and 2023.
