- SECTION 3. Balance of appropriation for Prosecuting Attorney of Fourth Judicial District to be paid to attorneys who performed his duties.
4. Act to take effect on passage.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or so much Money Appropriated thereof as may be necessary, be and the same are hereby appropriated for the following purposes, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to wit:

First—To Wm. W. Bacon, for safe for the State Auditor's office, A. D. 1858, the sum of eight hundred and five dollars (*For safe for Auditor* \$805).

Second—To Supreme Court Reporter for the years 1858 and 1859, six hundred dollars (*Supreme Court Reporter* \$600).

Third—To Dr. A. Muller for services as physician rendered at the State Prison, A. D. 1857 and 1858, the sum of one hundred and ninety-seven dollars (*Services as physician* \$197).

Fourth—To Geo. W. Moore, unpaid balance of account for printing Debates of Constitutional Convention, St. A. D. Balcombe, president, five hundred and sixty dollars and sixteen cents (*Printing* \$560 16).

Fifth—For unpaid expenses of the expedition to Wright County, the sum of two thousand six hundred and two dollars and thirty-five cents (*Expedition to Wright County* \$2,602 35).

Sixth—To Geo. W. Baker, Sheriff of Olmsted County, for fees and expenses of conveying convict from Rochester, in said county, to State Prison, A. D. 1859, the sum of one hundred and nineteen dollars and sixteen cents (*Conveying Convicts* \$119 16).

Seventh—To F. E. Whiton, for conveying convict from Winona to State Prison, in 1859, one hundred and seven dollars and sixty cents (*Conveying Convict* \$107 60).

Eighth—To D. H. Tyner, for conveying convict from Blue Earth County to the State Prison, A. D. 1859, one hundred and twenty-one dollars (*Conveying Convict* \$121).

Ninth—For mileage and per diem of the County Treasurers coming to and returning from the State Capitol to pay over in full the State Tax for the year A. D. 1859, six hundred dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary (*Mileage and per diem of County Treasurer* \$600).

Tenth—For newspapers furnished members of the Legislature in the years 1857 and 1858 the following sums, to wit:

To A. J. Van Vorhes, fifty dollars and thirty-six cents (*For newspapers* \$50 36).

To *Red Wing Republican* forty-nine dollars (\$49).

To the *Minnesota Post*, sixty-six dollars (\$66).

To H. W. Hulley, seventeen dollars (\$17).

Eleventh—To Howard & Pendergrast, for stove and stove-pipe, the sum of thirty-one dollars (*For stove and stove-pipe* \$31).

- For chairs *Twelfth*—To J. D. Rich, for chairs furnished Legislature in 1859, the sum of twenty-five dollars (\$25).
- For sawing wood *Thirteenth*—To Edward Shields, for sawing wood in 1859, the sum of nineteen dollars (\$19).
- For translating message *Fourteenth*—To Eugene Bernard, for translating Gov. Gor- man's Message into the German and French languages, the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200).
- For printing *Fifteenth*—To J. A. Wheelock, for printing, advertising, and papers furnished members, the sum of thirty-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$36 25).
- For window shades *Sixteenth*—To Rufus King, for window shades furnished Capitol, in the year 1859, the sum of forty-four dollars (\$44).
- For chairs *Seventeenth*—To Washington Stees, for chairs furnished State, one hundred dollars (\$100).
- For repairs *Eighteenth*—To Golcher & Simpson, for fixing desks, the sum of fourteen dollars (\$14).
- For candles *Nineteenth*—To B. Presley, for candles, the sum of twenty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$29 50).
- For repairs *Twentieth*—To Martin Bray, the sum of three dollars (\$3).
- Twenty-first*—To C. C. Miles, for repairing done on Capitol buildings, A. D. 1859, the sum of fourteen dollars (\$14).
- Twenty-second*—To C. L. Grant, for pails, candle-sticks, and other articles, the sum of one hundred and eighty dollars and thirty-eight cents (\$180 38).
- For printing *Twenty-third*—To Pioneer Printing Company, for printing done for Attorney General Berry, the sum of six dollars and forty-eight cents (\$6 48).
- For lime &c. *Twenty-fourth*—To James Shepard, for lime furnished and labor done on Capitol, in the year 1859, the sum of twenty dollars (\$20).
- For Compiling General laws *Twenty-fifth*—To Aaron Goodrich, for services in compiling the General Laws as Commissioner, in 1858, the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800)—the warrant of the Auditor for which is to be drawn upon the certificate of the Governor that said compilation and digest has been delivered to the State.
- For conveying convict *Twenty-sixth*—To the Board of County Commissioners of Dodge County, for costs and expenses of conveying convict from Mantorville, in said county, to the State Prison, A. D. 1859, one hundred and ten dollars (\$110), or so much thereof as may be necessary.
- For repairs and sawing wood *Twenty-seventh*—To John Bell, for repairs made on the desks in the Capitol, previous to the meeting of this Legisla- ture, fifteen dollars (\$15); also to the same, for wood furnish- ed at the same time, eighty dollars (\$80).
- To keeper of the capitol *Twenty-eighth*—To John Bell, for arrearages in his salary as keeper of Capitol for the year 1859, two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250).
- Warrants—how issued Sec. 2. No warrant shall be issued by the Auditor for any money appropriated in items six, seven, eight, nine, ten, fifteen and twenty-six, of the foregoing section, except upon the cer-

tificate of the Governor; nor shall any warrant or certificate be issued for a larger amount than is herein appropriated, nor for any amount except on the presentation of a detailed account properly verified and a receipt in full for such account.

Sec. 3. That the balance of the appropriation made for the Prosecuting Attorney, of the Fourth Judicial District, under the appropriation bill approved August twelfth, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and undrawn by said Attorney in consequence of his resignation, is hereby directed to be paid to the attorneys who performed the said services in his place by order of the Court, in proportion to the amount certified to each, by the Judge of said Judicial District; *Provided*, That if any county has already paid the attorney for so acting in place of the Prosecuting Attorney, such county shall be entitled to receive the amount so paid, out of the balance of the appropriation aforesaid.

Sec. 4. This Act shall take effect from and after its passage.

CHAPTER XXVIII.

An Act to regulate the Fees of Clerks of District Courts.

- Section 1. Amendment of Section two of Chapter seventy-three of the Revised Statutes, relative to fees of Clerk of District Court.
2. Repeal of portion of said Section allowing per diem of five dollars.
3. Act to take effect immediately.
