SEC. 2. This act shall take effect from and after March 1st, A. D. 1863.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same is hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the salaries of the State officers, and for other expenditures in support of the State government for the year 1863, and for other purposes:

Second. For the salary of the Secretary of State, twelve hundred dollars, (\$1,200).

Third. For the salary of the Auditor of State, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000).

Fourth. For the salary of the Treasurer of State, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000).

Fifth. For the salary of the Attorney General, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000).

Sixth. For the salary of the Adjutant General, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000.)

Seventh. For the salary of the State Librarian, six hundred dollars, (\$600).
