CHAPTER XXVII.

An Act relating to Probate Courts.

- SECTION 1. When Judge of Probate shall be an executor or administrator, the Judge of Probate of another county may exercise jurisdiction.
 - 2. Repeal of former acts.
 - 5. When act to take effect.

Beitenacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

When judge of probate of another county may exere'se jurisdiction SECTION 1. That when any judge of probate, who would otherwise have jurisdiction of the estate of any deceased person, shall be an executor, or administrator of such estate, or in any way interested therein, or in any property claimed thereby, or is of kin by consanguinity or affinity to any person interested in such estate or property, in such degree as would be ground of challenge, as a juror in any action in which such last mentioned person was interested, then and in that case the judge of probate of an adjoining county, shall have and exercise jurisdiction of said estate, as in other cases.

Repeal of former

- SEC. 2. That chapter seventy-six of the session laws of 1860, and chapter twenty-six of the session laws of 1863, both relating to judges of probate, and all other acts or parts of acts inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed.
- SEC. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
