

CHAPTER XXXIV.

An Act to Prohibit Smoking in Mills, Machine Shops, Stables, or other Buildings where notice prohibiting the same is kept posted. February 1, 1866.

SECTION 1. Prohibits, under penalty, smoking in certain buildings.

2. How Penalties to be recovered—actions to be brought by summons.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. No person shall enter any mill, machine shop, stable or other building, having with him a lighted pipe or cigar, or shall light or smoke any pipe or cigar therein, under a penalty of ten dollars. *Provided*, that a notice in plain, legible characters is kept posted up in a conspicuous position over or near each principal entrance to such building or place of entrance, that no smoking is allowed therein. And if any person shall deface, destroy or remove any such notice he shall forfeit and pay ten dollars for each offence.

Persons liable to penalty for smoking.

SEC. 2. Any penalty incurred under the provisions of this act shall be recoverable before any Justice of the Peace of the town wherein the offence is committed, for the benefit of said town, upon the written complaint on oath of any person showing the commission of any such offence, in an action wherein such town shall be plaintiff. Such action shall be commenced by summons, and shall be prosecuted in the same manner as civil actions.

How penalty recoverable.
