2. When act to take effect.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:*

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury belonging to the general revenue fund, for the payment of the salaries of the state officers, and for the support of the state government for the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven:

**EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT.**

- 1st. For the salary of governor, three thousand dollars.
- 2d. For the salary of secretary of state and superintendent of public printing, one thousand eight hundred dollars.
- 3d. For the salary of auditor of state, fifteen hundred dollars.
- 4th. For the salary of state treasurer, one thousand dollars.
- 5th. For the salary of attorney general, one thousand dollars.
- 6th. For the salary of adjutant general one thousand five hundred dollars.
- 7th. For the salary of the state land commissioner, one thousand dollars.
- 8th. For the salary of state librarian, six hundred dollars.
- 9th. For the salary of janitor, eight hundred dollars.
- 10th. For the salary of night watchman, six hundred dollars.

11th. For the salary of superintendent of public instruction, two thousand dollars.

25th. For postage, stationery and other incidental expenses in the adjutant general's office, seven hundred dollars.

26th. For postage, stationery and other incidental expenses in the attorney general's office, five hundred dollars, to be paid upon the order of the governor.

27th. For postage, stationery and other incidental expenses in the state library, one hundred and fifty dollars.

#### JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT.

28th. For the salaries of the judges of the supreme

and district courts, twenty-six thousand five hundred dollars.

29th. For the salary of the clerk of the supreme court, eight hundred dollars.

30th. For the salary of reporter of the supreme court, six hundred dollars.

31st. For postage, stationery and other incidental expenses of the supreme court, four hundred dollars.

32d. For the purchase of two hundred copies of volume reports of the supreme court, twelve hundred dollars.

### STATE LAND OFFICE.

33d. For selecting, appraising and selling school lands, three thousand dollars.

### PUBLIC PRINTING.

35th. For printing and binding the reports of the state officers and executive documents of the ninth regular session of the legislature, five thousand dollars.

36th. For incidental printing of the legislature, four thousand dollars.

37th. For printing and binding three hundred copies each of the journals of the senate and house of representatives, five thousand copies of the general laws, and five hundred copies of the special laws of the present legislature, two thousand dollars.

38th. For printing, binding and advertising for the several state departments, two thousand dollars.

39th. For the publication of laws in newspapers, six thousand dollars.

40th. For preparing laws and journals for publication, and indexing same, six hundred dollars.

41st. For furnishing paper necessary for public printing as provided by law, five thousand dollars.

### STATE PRISON.

44th. For building and furnishing cells in the state prison, four thousand eight hundred dollars, and for building work shop in prison yard, seven thousand dollars.

#### CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

45th. For the support of the indigent insane, fifteen thousand dollars.

46th. For the current expenses of the Deaf, Dumb and Blind Institute, at Faribault; for repairs and such other purposes for the use and benefit of the institution, as the trustees shall deem advisable for its best interests, eleven thousand nine hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
