

CHAPTER 31.

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION TWO HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE (289) OF CHAPTER SIXTY-SIX (66) OF THE GENERAL STATUTES OF MINNESOTA, REVISION OF ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-SIX (1866).

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That section two hundred and eighty-nine (289) of chapter sixty-six (66) of the general statutes of Minnesota, revision of one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six (1866), be amended by adding at the end of said section the following words: and shall be *prima facie* evidence of the facts therein stated.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 32.

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION TWO HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE (289) OF CHAPTER SIXTY-SIX (66) OF THE GENERAL STATUTES, RELATING TO CIVIL ACTIONS.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That section two hundred and eighty-nine (289) of chapter sixty-six (66) of the general statutes, as amended by chapter forty-five (45) of the General Laws of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six (1876), be and the same is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof, the following words: "And in case of any such sale heretofore made, upon which no certificate has been made or delivered by the officer, such officer or his successor in office may make and deliver to the purchaser such certificate, at any time within six (6) months after the passage of this act; and any certificate upon any such sale heretofore made, whether such certificate has heretofore been or shall hereafter be made and delivered by such officer, may hereafter be recorded with like force and effect, as if recorded within the time originally provided therefor."

Relating to certificates of sale on execution not heretofore made.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
