

SEC. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to catch fish in the running waters of said lake or in any of the inlets or outlets of said lakes, with a gill net.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 158.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR THE GENERAL EXPENSES OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT FOR THE YEARS ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-ONE (1881) AND ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND EIGHTY TWO (1882).

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the State Treasury belonging to the general revenue fund not otherwise appropriated for the payment of the general expenses of the State government for the years one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one (1881) and deficiencies of one thousand eight hundred and eighty (1880).

General appropriations for 1881 and 1882.

Deficiency of 1880.

First—For executive contingent fund for State purposes and incidental expenses of the Governor's office, three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

Contingent funds.

Second—For incidental expenses of the Secretary of State's office, four hundred dollars (\$400).

Third—For incidental expenses of the State Auditor's office, five hundred dollars (\$500).

Fourth—For incidental expenses of the State Treasurer's office three hundred and fifty dollars (\$350).

CHAPTER 159.

AN ACT TO FIX THE SALARY OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Salary of attorney general

SECTION 1. That the salary for the Attorney General for the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-one (1881), and annually thereafter, shall be two thousand and five hundred dollars (\$2500).

SEC. 2. That subdivision five (5) of section ten (10) of chapter seven (7) of the General Statutes of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight (1878), be and the same is hereby amended by striking out the words two thousand (2000) and inserting the words twenty-five hundred (2500).

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
