CHAPTER 3.

AN ACT TO INCORPORATE THE VILLAGE OF AUDUBON IN THE COUNTY OF BECKER AND STATE OF MINNESOTA.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. That the following described territory in the county of Becker, State of Minnesota, to-wit, the east half (\frac{1}{2}) of the southeast quarter (\frac{1}{4}) of section nine (9), the southwest quarter (\frac{1}{4}) of section ten (10) and lots number one (1), two (2) and three (3) of the northeast quarter (\frac{1}{4}) of section fifteen (15), all in township number one hundred and thirty-nine (139), range number forty-two (42) west, be and the same is hereby set apart for incorporation, and the same is hereby incorporated under the corporate name and style of the village of Audubon, to be organized pursuant to chapter one hundred and thirty-nine (139) of the General Laws of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five (1875) and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 2. That M. Gillespie, Benjaman F. Hernstock and Burr Johnson are hereby designated as commissioners who shall give notice of and for a meeting of the legal voters of said territory, to organize said village and elect officers pursuant to the provisions of section nine (9) of chapter one hundred and thirty-nine (139) of the General Laws of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five (1875).

Sec. 3. In addition to the general powers conferred by the said chapter the village council of said village shall also have power

1st. To provide for the planting of shade and ornamental trees along the streets, alleys and public squares of said village.

2d. To provide by ordnance for the compensation of the mem-

bers of the village council.

3d. To provide and direct that all ordinances may be posted in three of the most public places in said village, pursuant to section six (6) of said chapter;

Provided, however, if there shall be a newspaper published in said village, then all ordinances shall be published in said newspaper.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and af-

ter its passage.
