JOINT RESOLUTION ASKING CONGRESS TO GRANT PERMISSION TO BRIDGE THE MISSISSIPPI [RIVER] AT ST. PAUL.

WHEREAS, The city of St. Paul has, by a vote of its people, decided to build an additional bridge across the Mississippi river within its limits, and

WHEREAS, The consent of the national government has to be pro-

cured before the Mississippi can be bridged, therefore be it

Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

That our representatives in Congress be and they are hereby requested to obtain from Congress the necessary authority to build said bridge.

Resolved, That the Secretary of State be requested to send a copy of these resolutions to each of our senators and representatives in Con-

gress.

A JOINT RESOLUTION FOR THE RELIEF OF JOHN FENSKE.

WHEREAS, John Fenske, of the city of New Ulm, in the county of Brown and State of Minnesota, on the eighteenth (18th) day of August, A. D one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two (1862), while in the employment of the United States as a mechanic, and while endeavoring to save the property of the government from destruction, received a severe wound from Sioux Indians, whereby he was permanently disabled; and,

WHEREAS, A bill has been introduced in the congress of the United States, providing that the name of said John Fenske be placed

on the roll of invalid pensioners; therefore,

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

That our Senators and Representatives in Congress be, and are hereby requested to use their influence to secure the immediate passage of an act granting an invalid pension to said John Fenske, and that the same date from the time of receiving said injury,

Reselved, That the Secretary of State forward a copy of these reso-

lutions to each of our Senators and Representatives in Congress.
