CHAPTER 436.

AN ACT TO EXTEND THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF WASECA, IN WASECA COUNTY.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the north one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ of the northeast quarter $(\frac{1}{4})$ of the southwest quarter $(\frac{1}{4})$ of section seventeen (17) in township one hundred and seven (107) north of range twenty-two (22) west, in the county of Waseca and state of Minnesota, be and the same is hereby attached to and embraced within the corporate limits of the city of Waseca in said county of Waseca.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after

its passage.

CHAPTER 437.

[H. F. No. 776.]

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT THE POLLUTION OF THE WATERS OF LAKE LANGDON, NEAR LAKE MINNETONKA.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful and every person is forbidden and prohibited from putting in or depositing in the waters of Lake Langdon, a small lake near Lake Minnetonka, sewerage, decayed liquid animal or vegetable matter, and all kinds of filth, and likewise every person is prohibited from depositing the same upon the ice in the winter time, especially manure or the bodies of dead animals.

SEC. 2. All persons are prohibited from butchering upon the shores of said lake, and from erecting slaughter and rendering establishments or like nuisances within one-half (3) mile from the same.

SEC. 3. Whoever violates the provisions of this act shall be guilty

SEC. 3. Whoever violates the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred (100) dollars, or imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding ninety days. They may be both fined and imprisoned. Persons violating the provisions of this act may be enjoined from continuing said violation. A justice of the peace may have jurisdiction to impose the fine and punishment prescribed by this act.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its
