AN ACT TO REPEAL CHAPTER TWO HUNDRED AND SIXTY-THREE (263) OF THE SPECIAL LAWS OF ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-THREE (1883), BEING AN ACT TO AUTHORIZE THE ANOLENT ORDER OF HIBERNIANS OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, TO BECOME INCORPORATED.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That chapter two hundred and sixty-three (263) of the special laws of the year one thousand eight hundred and eighty-three (1883), be and the same is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after

its passage.

CHAPTER 469.

[H F. No. 684.]

AN ACT TO PREVENT FISHING FOR SALE OR COMMERCIAL PURPOSES, IN FOREST LAKE AND CLEAR LAKE, WASHINGTON COUNTY, MINNESOTA.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to take, catch, kill or destroy at any time in any way or manner, for the purpose of sale, or for commercial purposes, any kind of fish within the waters of Forest Lake or Clear Lake or their inlets or outlets situated in Washington county.

Sec. 2. That no person or persons shall sell, or offer for sale, export or ship from the town of Forest Lake in said Washington county, fish of any kind taken from the waters of said Forest Lake

and Clear Lake or their inlets or outlets.

Sec. 3. Any person or persons violating the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall pay a fine for each and every such offense of not less than five (\$5) dollars and not more than twenty-five (\$25) dollars together with costs of prosecution, and on default in the payment thereof may be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding twenty-five (25) days. All fines collected under the provisions of this act shall be paid in each and every case, one-half $\binom{1}{2}$ to the complainant and one-half $\binom{1}{2}$ to the general fund of the town of Forest Lake.

SEC. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its

passage.
