If a majority of the voters voting on said proposition shall vote in favor thereof then and in such case, the proceedings for condemnation therein provided for shall be taken. The votes cast at such election shall be counted, returned and canvassed the same as at other municipal elections and the result certified to the clerk or recorder by the canvassing board.

SEC. 14. This act shall in no wise apply to waterworks plants which are used or operated in connection with any electric light plant, nor to cities now having and owning a system of waterworks.

SEC. 15. Any proceedings by this act authorized must be instituted within one year from the approval of this act, and if such proceedings are not so instituted by any city within such period, it shall thereafter have no power or authority to proceed as in this act provided.

SEC. 16. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 285.

An act to appropriate money for the general expense of the state government and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

CHAPTER 286.

S. F. No. 270.

An Act to provide for the appointment by the board of control of state institutions of a state agent for the aid and supervision of paroled or discharged prisoners. Board of control.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. The board of control of state institutions may at any time when it deems it necessary appoint a state agent for the aid and supervision of paroled or discharged prisoners. The said state agent shall receive such salary as it shall fix and determine, together with the necessary traveling expenses incurred in the discharge of his duties, and he shall perform such duties at it may prescribe in behalf or in supervision of prisoners paroled or discharged from the state prison, the state reformatory, or any other public prison in this state, including the return of paroled prisoners to such institutions. It shall be his special duty to assist discharged or paroled prisoners in obtaining employment. The salary and expenses of said state agent shall be paid from Special duty.
