

ern and regulate the commitment of girls to the school hereby established, and as soon as the school hereby established shall be ready for occupancy, of which notice shall be given by the board of control, all girls theretofore committed to and then in the state training school for boys and girls aforesaid, created and established shall be transferred by the board of control to the school hereby established; and thereafter all girls committed under chapter one hundred fifty-three aforesaid, and acts amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, or which may hereafter be enacted as related to the subject matter thereof, shall be committed to the "Minnesota Home School for Girls" hereby created and established.

Sec. 6. It is hereby made the duty of the governor of Minnesota to appoint, as soon as may be after the passage of this act, and annually after August 1, 1907, an advisory board of five women, to be known and styled as the "Board of Women Visitors of the Minnesota Home School for Girls."

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 4—H. F. No. 6.

An Act prohibiting the locating, or maintaining of cemeteries or burial grounds or the burying of any human body within three-quarters of a mile of the University of Minnesota, or the Minnesota Soldiers' Home, and fixing the punishment for the violation thereof.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Prohibiting cemetery near university or soldiers' home.—

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, association or corporation, to locate or maintain a cemetery or burial ground for the purpose of burying any human body, or the burying of any human body within three-quarters of a mile of the university of the State of Minnesota, or the Minnesota soldiers' home.

Gross misdemeanor.—Sec. 2. Any person, firm, association or corporation, violating section 1 of this act shall be guilty of a gross misdemeanor for each and every offense.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
