

## CHAPTER 9—H. F. No. 156.

*An act to appropriate money for the payment of the per diem of the employees of, and all the other expenses of the legislature, including payment for necessary supplies therefor.*

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. **\$12,000 additional appropriation for legislative expenses.**—The sum of twelve thousand (\$12,000.00) dollars is hereby appropriated out of the general revenue fund of the state of Minnesota for the purpose of paying the per diem of the officers and employees, and all other expenses of the legislature, including payment for necessary supplies therefor.

CHAPTER 10—S. F. No. 53.

*An act making it a felony for any person to enter any room wherein, in whole or in part, a general banking business is carried on, or wherein in whole or in part, a business of receiving securities, evidence of debts or any other valuable papers on deposit or for safe keeping, in which there is at that time a human being, with intent to commit a felony therein by means of threats, force or violence, and prescribing the punishment therefor.*

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. **Life imprisonment for bank robbers.**—Every person who with intent to commit a felony therein by means of threats, force or violence, shall enter at any time, any room wherein in whole or in part a general banking business is carried on, or any room wherein, in whole or in part, the business of receiving securities, evidence of debt, or any other valuable papers for deposit or safe keeping is carried on, or wherein, in whole or in part, a business of general banking and receiving securities, evidence of debt or any other valuable papers, on deposit or for safe keeping, is carried on, in which room, there shall be at the time a human being, shall be guilty of a felony and punished by imprisonment for life in the state prison.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
