CHAPTER 424—H. F. No. 1460.

An act to appropriate money for state educational institutions and for other purposes, prescribing present and future regulations and limitations relative to the expenditure of certain portions thereof, and conferring upon the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota the power of eminent domain in certain cases.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Appropriation for educational institutions.—The sums hereinafter named, or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated from any moneys in the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated for the purposes specified in the following sections of this act, to be available where not otherwise stated for each of the fiscal years ending June 30, 1926, and June 30, 1927.

Sec. 2. State University, University Farm School and Experiment Schools and Stations:

- 1. For maintenance and special equipment. \$3,200,000
Said sums to cover any amount which may become due to the University under the provisions of Chapter 411, Laws 1921.
- 2. To reimburse the Minnesota General Hospital for actual expenses incurred for patients from April 1, 1923, up to and including April 1, 1925, as per certificate on file in the State Auditor's office, under Section 7, Chapter 411, Laws 1921, immediately available 167,268.00

Provided, that the money derived from rents when and as collected from the buildings on the campus is hereby appropriated for the maintenance and improvements of the University Campus.

Provided, that the appropriation made by item "4" of Section 4 of Chapter 466, Laws 1919, and renewed by Section 2 of Chapter 446, Laws 1923, may at the discretion of the Board of Regents be

used in the construction of an addition to the Experiment Engineering Building for rental in whole or in part to the Minnesota Highway Department for laboratory purposes.

Provided that the Board of Regents of the University of Minnesota may use any money not specifically appropriated for other purposes, for acquiring land by purchase or condemnation. In case it is desired to use the fund for the acquisition of land, the power of eminent domain may be exercised either in accordance with sections 4085 to 4091 inclusive, General Statutes 1894, or Chapter 41 of the Revised Laws of 1905.

 e. For construction of heating and power plant, available for the year ending June 30, 1926 80,000

3. MANKATO:

- a. For maintenance, including summer session and library 138,000

 d. Provided that out of any unexpended balances now remaining in the Maintenance Fund of the Mankato State Teachers' College, expenditures for cafeteria equipment and material now installed in the College are hereby authorized in the sum of not to exceed 5,000

- Sec. 4. Aid to Schools:
- 1. For aid to high, graded, semi-graded, consolidated, industrial and rural schools to be distributed as provided by law, available for each of the years ending June 30, 1925, and June 30, 1926 5,500,000

Provided, that the payment of state aid shall not be held contingent, either by the Commissioner of Education or by the State Board of Education, upon the erection, construction or enlargement of any school building in any school which received such aid for the year ending June 30, 1924, and which in other respects is entitled thereto. Of the amounts specified in Items 1 hereof no aid in the building or erection of consolidated rural schools shall be given in excess of \$3,000, any law to the contrary notwithstanding, but this proviso shall not be effective to any buildings under erection or contemplated at the time of the passage of this act.

- 2. For assistance in maintaining public schools on Indian reservations, or territory heretofore occupied as such, where the taxable property is not sufficient to maintain public schools for five months, to be expended by the superintendent of education, through the county board of edu-

CHAPTER 425—S. F. No. 1305.

An act to appropriate money for the payment of claims against the State of Minnesota; to provide for tax and other refundments; to provide for the reimbursement and compensation of certain employees of the state, having claims for personal injuries sustained or for loss or damage of property incurred while engaged in the performance of their duties, and for the relief of dependents of certain employees of the state for the death of such employees while engaged in the performance of their duties; to provide for the reimbursement and compensation of persons for injuries sustained or for loss or damage to property by certain employees of the state while engaged in the performance of their duties, and by inmates of state institutions; and for the relief of dependents of certain persons for the death of such persons caused by acts of certain employees of the state while engaged in the performance of their duties; to provide for repairs to and maintenance and completion of state armories; to provide for payments to certain persons for services performed to
