

CHAPTER 45—H. F. No. 556

An act relating to the salaries of county commissioners in certain counties containing not less than 17 nor more than 18 full or fractional congressional townships, having an assessed valuation of not less than \$5,000,000.00 nor more than \$6,000,000.00, and a population of not less than 8,000 nor more than 12,500.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Salaries of county board in certain counties.—In each county of this state containing not less than 17 nor more than 18 full or fractional congressional townships, and having an assessed valuation of not less than \$5,000,000.00 nor more than \$6,000,000.00, and a population of not less than 8,000 nor more than 12,500, the several county commissioners shall receive a salary of \$325.00 per year to be paid in 12 equal installments. In addition thereto such commissioners shall receive such further allowances and expenses as are now provided by law.

Sec. 2. Certain payments validated.—In case in any such county any county commissioner during the years 1928, 1929, 1930, and 1931, or any part of said period, has been paid a salary at a rate exceeding that provided by law, but not exceeding the rate of \$325.00 per year, such payment is hereby legalized and made valid.

Sec. 3. Effective on passage.—All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

CHAPTER 46—S. F. No. 370

An act to legalize corporations organized and doing business under Title 2, Chapter 34, General Statutes of Minnesota of 1894 and amendatory acts.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Cemetery associations legalized and acts validated.—That all *Cemetery Associations or Cemetery* corporations organized under Title 2 Chapter 34 General Statutes of Minnesota of 1894 and now conducting the business specified in their articles of incorporation or any amendments thereof are hereby legalized and validated in all respects and shall exercise and enjoy all powers, rights and privileges possessed by them under their original articles of incorporation or any amendments thereof and the laws applicable thereto in force at the time of the execution, adopting or filing of their original articles of incorporation and any amendments thereof

and their charters shall not be forfeited for any defect in their incorporation or any act or omission occurring prior to the passage of this act.

Sec. 2. **Application.**—This act shall not apply to any action or proceeding now pending in the courts of this state, and shall not be construed to exempt any corporation or any director, officer or agent thereof from prosecution for any criminal act whatsoever.

Sec. 3. **Effective on passage.**—This act shall take effect from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 47—H. F. 15

An act to amend Laws 1925, Chapter 116, Section 1, Subdivision Section 2, as amended by Laws 1927, Chapter 58, relating to the salaries of certain village officers.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. **Salaries of village officers in certain villages.**—That Subdivision Two of Section One, Chapter 116, Laws 1925, as amended by Chapter 58, Laws 1927, be and the hereby is amended to read as follows:

“Subdivision 2. In Villages not included in any of the foregoing classifications, having both a population of not less than *One Thousand Five Hundred* inhabitants and an assessed valuation of not less than *Four Million Five Hundred Thousand (\$4,500,000)* dollars, or having a population of not less than *One Thousand two hundred* inhabitants and an assessed valuation of not less than *Six million (\$6,000,000)* dollars, the salary of the President is fixed at *Eighty (\$80.00)* dollars per month and the salary of each Trustee at *Sixty (\$60.00)* dollars per month.”

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 48—H. F. No. 148

An act creating a fund for the relief of sick, disabled or retired policemen; creating pensions for disabled or retired policemen and their widows and children under 16 years of age; and for disabled or retired police matrons and their children under 16 years of age; and creating pensions for the widows of the policemen who have
