

WHEREAS, this appears to be a discrimination against Aid to Dependent Children, and not a fair apportionment,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the State of Minnesota, the House of Representatives concurring therein, that Congress at its present sitting, be and the same is hereby urgently petitioned and requested to amend the Social Security Act or to pass other appropriate legislation whereby the Federal Government will assume one-half of the burden and payment of Aid to Dependent Children.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a duly authenticated copy of this resolution be presented to the President of the United States, the presiding officers of the Senate and House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, and to each of the Senators and Representatives from the State of Minnesota.

RESOLUTION No. 16 (S. F. No. 1001)

A joint resolution calling for the observance of a national patriotic revival and the observance of "Flag Week", June 8, to 14, 1939.

WHEREAS, The whole world, rent asunder by strife and contention, violence and intolerance, is today in a state of turmoil and uncertainty, marked by a titantic struggle between democracy and autocracy, while in this country anti-American forces are striving to discredit and destroy the ideals and institutions symbolized by the American flag, and social, political and economic forces are combating one another; and

WHEREAS, Never before in the history of the nation has there been greater need among our people for the unity, cooperation and tolerance for which our country's flag stands; and

WHEREAS, With the Stars and Stripes as its emblem the United States flag association, a non-profit, non-partisan and non-sectarian organization incorporated under federal law and headed by the President of the United States as Honorary President General, is, with the cooperation of various groups, organizations and fields of activity in our national life, conducting a national patriotic revival, culminating in "Flag Week", June 8th to 14th next, for the two-fold purpose (1) of awakening our people to the dangers threatening our national

life, thereby causing them to resolve as never before to uphold and preserve our country's ideals and institutions, and (2) of promoting national unity, patriotic cooperation and racial and religious tolerance;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, By the Senate of the state of Minnesota, the House of Representatives concurring, that they heartily endorse the plan for a great national patriotic revival, and that the governor is hereby authorized and requested, first to direct the commissioner of education to arrange for the suitable observance of Flag Week in all the public schools, and, secondly, to issue a proclamation calling upon the state officials to display the United States flag on all state buildings during Flag Week, and inviting the people of the state to fly the flag at their homes and other suitable places as well as on their cars, and that in every community they hold special exercises to give significant expression to our thoughtful love of America, and our pride in its glorious history, our faith in its destiny, our devotion to its ideals and institutions and our determination to uphold and preserve them now and forever.

RESOLUTION No. 17 (S. F. No. 1206)

A joint resolution. The Legislature of the State of Minnesota, in regular session assembled, memorializing the Congress of the United States to enact legislation relieving the farmers who gave their notes for feed during the drought years, 1933 and 1934 from cash payment thereof.

WHEREAS, the citizens of the state of Minnesota witnessed a severe drought during the years 1933 and 1934, which drought worked a tremendous hardship on the farmers of this state and made it necessary for them to purchase feed for their animals, and

WHEREAS, the federal government found it necessary to ship large quantities of feed to the drought stricken areas which was sold to the farmers at exorbitant prices, in excess of the present price tenfold, and for which the farmers gave their note to the federal government, and

WHEREAS, it was to the advantage of all the people of our state that those animals should be and were fed, and
