CHAPTER 580-H. F. No. 1903

An act relating to the production, procurement, distribution, and planting of trees, shrubs and vines for conservation purposes, authorizing the commissioner of conservation to supply planting stock therefore for use in auxiliary forests owned and maintained by certain corporations organized for benevolent or other purposes not for profit; amending Minnesota Statutes 1949, Section 89.37, Subdivisions 2 and 3.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

- Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 1949, Section 89.37, Subdivision 2, is amended to read:
- Subd. 2. Public lands, supply. Such planting stock may be supplied for use on any lands owned by or subject to an easement or right of way held by the state or by any political subdivision of the state free of charge or upon payment of all or any part of the cost of such stock or expenses of distribution, as the commissioner may determine. Such planting stock may be supplied under like conditions for use in any auxiliary forest owned and maintained by any corporation organized for religious, social, moral, educational, scientific, benevolent, charitable, fraternal, or reformatory purposes and not for profit.
- Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 1949, Section 89.37, Subdivision 3, is amended to read:
- Subd. 3. **Private lands, supply.** Except as otherwise expressly provided, such planting stock in lots of not less than 500 may be supplied for use on private land only upon payment of such sum as the commissioner shall determine to be fair and reasonable.
