The several rates of taxation levied by subdivision 1 on all intoxicating liquors sold in this state are increased 15 percent except on intoxicating liquors which are within the state on June 30, 1959, and which have been sold within this state by a licensed manufacturer or wholesaler to a retailer or ultimate consumer on or before June 30, 1959. The increase in the several rates of taxation levied by this subdivision on all intoxicating liquors sold in this state shall hereafter be known as the surtax on intoxicating liquors.

The surtax levied hereunder shall be reduced by a credit for any surtax previously paid pursuant to the provisions of section 340.47, subdivision 3.

Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision 1 and section 340.60, subdivision 2, the proceeds of the surtax imposed by this subdivision shall be deposited in the state treasury to the credit of the general fund.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. State government; organization and operation. Except as herein otherwise specifically provided, the sums hereinafter set forth in the columns designated "APPRO-PRIATIONS", or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated out of the general fund in the state treasury, or any other fund herein designated, for the purposes specified in the following sections of this act, to be available for the fiscal years indicated for each purpose. There is hereby transferred from the general fund to the highway user tax distribution fund the sum of \$150.00 which sum was erroneously paid as a claim in accordance with the provisions of Laws 1969, Chapter 1066, Section 2, Subdivision 4.

Sec. 57. [16.173] APPROVED COMPLEMENTS. Whenever an appropriation to any state department or agency for salaries discloses an approved complement, that department or agency, except for seasonal and part time employees, is limited in the employment of the number of persons indicated by such approved complement. The employment of seasonal and part time employees shall be in addition to the approved complement but subject to the approval of the commissioner of administration who shall determine the need therefor.

Additional employees over the number of the approved complement may be employed on the basis of public necessity or emergency with the written approval of the governor, but the governor shall not approve such additional personnel until he has consulted with the legislative advisory committee created by Laws 1943, Chapter 594, and such committee has made its recommendation upon the matter. Such recommendation shall be advisory only. Failure or refusal of the committee to make a recommendation promptly shall be deemed a negative recommendation. The provisions hereof shall extend to any other agency to which the present authority of the legislative advisory committee may be transferred, but shall be deemed to be repealed in case such authority shall be abolished.

Sec. 58. [16.075] FURNITURE PURCHASED FROM STATE REFORMATORY. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, state departments may purchase furniture from the state reformatory for men.

Sec. 59. [16.247] PUBLICATIONS BY DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION. Notwithstanding the provisions of Laws 1963, Chapter 100, or any other law relating to the subject matter of this section, the department of administration

may continue to publish reports, documents, and related materials of the same manner described in its catalogs of Minnesota state publications.

Sec. 60. Any moneys made available to any state department or agency by this act of appropriation, transfer or otherwise for the payment of salaries is a source of revenue to such department or agency under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes 1969, Sections 355.50 and 352.04, Subdivision 5.

Sec. 61. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, state departments and agencies may, with the approval of the commissioner of administration, eliminate authorized positions and use the moneys for purchase of interdepartmental tabulating services from the department of administration, informations systems division, or for the leasing or purchase of equipment if such is found to be more economical than filling of authorized positions. Such moneys are hereby authorized to be transferred to the supplies and expense account of the department. Such moneys transferred are hereby appropriated for this purpose.

The commissioner of administration, in reviewing the proposals, shall also review the documentation presented indicating the analysis of the cost benefit and reduction of personnel or other savings or benefit that will occur with the computerization or further computerization of the systems involved in the proposal. Upon implementation of the proposal, the complement shall be reduced and the indicated savings reserved and cancelled.

Sec. 62. [97.48] [Subd. 28.] Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, any moneys appropriated to the commissioner of administration for the acquisition of wildlife land under Minnesota Statutes 1969, Sections 97.48, Subdivision 13, and 97.481, shall be expended in the same manner as similar expenditures are made by the commissioner of natural resources under such statutory provisions. In order to qualify for federal Pittman-Robertson funds, the commissioner of administration may transfer any of these moneys to the commissioner of natural resources for expenditure for wildlife land acquisition, and any such transfers are hereby reappropriated for such purpose.

- Sec. 63. [15.063] BIENNIAL REPORTS; SUBMIS-SION. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the biennial reports required to be submitted to the legislature by various departments and agencies shall be submitted by November 15 of each even numbered year.
- Sec. 64. COMPULSORY RETIREMENT EXCLUSION. Notwithstanding any provision of laws to the contrary, a physician in the classified or unclassified state service may during this biennium, upon reaching the age of 70 years continue to be employed in the department of health subject to annual certification by the state board of health.
- Sec. 65. [16.155] BUDGET ESTIMATES SUBMITTED TO LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEES. Subdivision 1. The commissioner of administration shall transmit a copy of the budget estimates and accompanying information for the biennial budget as submitted by each department or agency to the commissioner in accordance with Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 16.14, to the committee on finance of the senate and to the committee on appropriations of the house of representatives on or before the 15th day of November preceding the convening of a regular session of the legislature.
- Subd. 2. The budget to the legislature submitted by the governor in accordance with Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 16.15, shall include the budget request of each department or agency arranged in tabular form so it may readily be compared with the governor's budget for each department or agency.
- Sec. 66. [16.138] CERTAIN REIMBURSEMENTS DE-POSITED IN GENERAL FUND. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, reimbursements received by departments or agencies for services performed by other state agencies for which they are not billed shall be transferred for deposit into the general fund. Departments or agencies shall report such reimbursements to the commissioner of administration when the reimbursement is received. The commissioner after review shall certify the amount of each reimbursement to the state auditor and shall report such reimbursements to the committee on finance of the senate and the committee on appropriations of the house of representatives. Upon certification the state auditor

shall transfer to the general fund such amounts from such accounts as the commissioner may designate.

Sec. 67. [648.39] MINNESOTA STATUTES AND SES-SION LAWS; SALE AND DISTRIBUTION. Subdivision 1. To the extent that appropriations are available therefor, the revisor of statutes shall distribute each edition of Minnesota Statutes and each edition of the session laws as follows:

30 copies to the supreme court;

1 copy to each judge of a district court;

1 copy to the clerk of each district court for use in each courtroom of the district court of his county;

100 copies to the state law library;

100 copies to the law school of the university of Minnesota;

35 copies to the office of the attorney general;

Such copies as may be necessary but not exceeding ten to the departments of administration, agriculture, commerce, corrections, education, health, highways, labor and industry, manpower services, natural resources, public safety, public service, public welfare, and taxation, and ten copies also to the governor's office;

1 copy each to the state departments, agencies, boards, and commissions that may request a copy;

1 copy to each member of the legislature;

The necessary number of copies required for the use of the senate and the house of representatives;

4 copies to the secretary of the senate;

4 copies to the chief clerk of the house of representatives;

1 copy to each judge, district attorney, clerk of court of the United States and the deputy clerk of each division of the United States district court in this state, the secretary of state of the United States, the library of congress, and the Minnesota historical society.

Subd. 2. Each county shall purchase from the revisor of statutes one copy each for the use of the judge of probate, county attorney, sheriff, auditor, treasurer, register of deeds, and superintendent of schools.

- Subd. 3. Each city, village, borough, and town shall purchase from the revisor of statutes, for the use of each justice of the peace, judge of the municipal court, clerk of the municipal court, and clerk of the city, village, borough, or town, as the case may be, such number of copies as the city, village, borough, or town shall determine is needed.
- Subd. 4. A department, agency, board, commission, or other instrumentality of the state listed in this section may purchase from the revisor of statutes any additional copies which may be required.
- Subd. 5. The sale price for each edition of Minnesota Statutes is not less than the actual cost thereof but in no event less than \$100. The sale price of each edition of Minnesota session laws is not less than the actual cost thereof but in no event less than \$35. Nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to fix the sale prices of paper back editions of each of the publications should the revisor of statutes deem it desirable to publish paper back copies.
- Subd. 6. Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 648.39, is repealed.
- Sec. 68. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, any state department or agency having less than five employees is authorized to grant not more than one achievement award in the amount of one salary's step in each year of the biennium. The employee receiving the achievement award shall have demonstrated outstanding performance. The appointing authorities shall supply the justification as otherwise provided by law.
- Sec. 69. Laws 1969, Chapter 1139, Sections 56 and 72 and Chapter 879, Section 4, Subdivisions 1 through 6 are hereby repealed.
- Sec. 70. [3.103] SPECIAL SESSION LIVING EXPENS-ES. Each member of the legislature, during a special session thereof, shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred in the performance of his duties in the same amounts, for the same purposes, and in the same manner as were authorized for the members of the senate and the members of the house of representatives at the last regular session occurring immediately prior to

such special session. Reimbursement for travel, however, shall not exceed more than one round trip per member per each seven calendar days in which the legislature meets in such special session. This section applies to each special session of the legislature commencing after May 24, 1971.

- Sec. 71. Money heretofore appropriated for Educational Program Planning shall not cancel on June 30, 1972, and is available for the second year of the biennium.
- Sec. 72. The state auditor is directed to transfer the balance remaining in the revolving fund for manufacturing license plates established by Laws 1957, Chapter 412. He shall return to the trunk highway fund the \$90,000 that was transferred under Laws 1947, Chapter 582, and the balance shall be transferred to the general fund.
- Sec. 73. Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, the officers and supervisors of the highway patrol shall receive only those percentage increases in salaries granted to other state employees. The salary increases directed by this section are in lieu of any provision of law now existing relating to longevity pay or any other basis of salary increases.

In the event that a salary bill for the unclassified members of the highway patrol is enacted by the 1971 regular or special legislative session, this section shall not apply.

In the event separate legislation enacted at the 1971 regular or special legislative session would provide salary increases to the unclassified personnel of the highway patrol in excess of the increases in this act, such increases shall be placed into effect in accordance with the provisions of that legislation. The commissioner of administration shall certify to the state auditor the additional amount required to implement the salary increases. The workpapers of the committee on finance of the senate and the committee on appropriations of the house of representatives shall be used as a guide as to the additional amount required. The state auditor is directed to transfer from the trunk highway fund to the department of public safety salaries account the amount certified. The amounts transferred are appropriated for the purposes of implementing the salary increases of the unclassified personnel of the highway patrol.

There is appropriated annually from the fund or account in the state treasury to which the rental money from state leased property is credited a sufficient amount of money to carry out the state's obligations under the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Sections 161.23, Subdivision 3, and 272.68, Subdivision 3.
- Sec. 76. [15A.20] MILEAGE ALLOWANCES. Subdivision 1. Except as provided in subdivision 3, the maximum amount which shall be paid by the state, any department or bureau thereof, or any county, city, village, town, or school district, to any officer or employee, except sheriffs or deputy sheriffs, as compensation or reimbursement for the use by such officer of his own automobile in the performance of his duties shall not exceed ten cents a mile.
- Subd. 2. Subdivision 1 takes the place of Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 15A.20, Subdivision 1.
- Subd. 3. Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 15A.20, Subdivision 1 is repealed.
- Subd. 4. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law, a state officer or employee when traveling intrastate on official business who drives his personal car when a motor pool vehicle is available shall be reimbursed at the motor pool mileage rate for a comparable vehicle. Provided, however, that if use of a motor pool vehicle would have resulted in a greater cost to the state than the reimbursement at the personal car rate, the employee shall be reimbursed at the personal car rate as set forth in Minnesota Statutes 15A.20, Subdivision 1. The commissioner of administration may promulgate such rules, regulations, and directives as necessary to carry out the provisions of this section.
- Sec. 77. [84.085] ACCEPTANCE OF GIFTS. Subdivision 1. The commissioner of natural resources may accept for and on behalf of the state any gift, bequest, device, or grants of lands or interest in lands or personal property of any kind or of money tendered to the state for any purpose pertaining to the activities of the department or any of its divisions. Any money so received is hereby appropriated and dedicated for the purpose for which it is granted.

- Subd. 2. Subdivision 1 takes the place of Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 84.085.
- Subd. 3. Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 84.085 is repealed.
- Sec. 78. [299F.39] [subd. 2.] REQUIREMENTS OF CODE. The code shall specify reasonable minimum requirements for fire safety in new and existing buildings and facilities. Regulations may be in accordance with the size, type of construction and nature of use or occupancy of such buildings or facilities. No regulation made in accordance with subdivisions 1, 2, and 3, shall be inconsistent with the provisions of the statutes nor impair the rights of municipalities to enact ordinances and make orders with respect to buildings as provided by law, so far as such ordinances or orders specify requirements equal to, additional to or more stringent than the regulations issued under authority of subdivisions 1, 2, and 3. Upon application, the state fire marshal may, in his discretion, grant variances from the minimum requirements specified in the code if (a) there is substantial compliance with the provisions of the code and (b) the safety of the public and occupants of such building will not be jeopardized, and (c) substantial damage will result to the applicant unless such variance is granted.
- Subd. 2. Subdivision 1 takes the place of Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 299F.39, Subdivision 2, which subdivision is hereby repealed.
- Sec. 79. The commissioner of administration shall not permit the allotment and encumbrance of the amounts indicated as excess appropriation on the work papers of the committee on finance of the senate and the committee on appropriations of the house of representatives. Such amounts shall be held as surplus and shall cancel. Provided however, if the amount of excess appropriation is appropriated from a dedicated fund he shall certify this amount to the state auditor. Upon receipt of the certification, the state auditor is directed to transfer the amount so certified back to the dedicated fund. This provision applies only to the biennium beginning July 1, 1971.

Sec. 80. Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, the Hastings state hospital may accommodate the number of patients on the upper campus that can be safely and adequately cared for as determined by the commissioner of public welfare.

As soon as feasible, the commissioner of public welfare and the commissioner of public safety shall enter into a written agreement as to the occupancy of the necessary buildings by the department of public safety for a Police Training School. Any costs for remodeling buildings shall be borne by the department of public safety.

- Sec. 81. The appropriations made in section 24 of this act shall be transferred to the commissioner of administration and the Minnesota historical society in accordance with the provisions of separate legislation enacted by the 1971 legislature. The commissioner of administration shall certify to the state auditor the amounts to be transferred to each agency. The amount of such reimbursement is \$25 per day as a per diem expense allowance for all expenses incurred except travel. He shall also be reimbursed for his travel expenses in the same amount as state employees are reimbursed for such travel.

Reimbursements to members of the legislature for out-ofstate meetings or other legislative activity shall be in the same amounts as state employees are reimbursed for such out-of-state expenses.

Expenses for members of the legislature are payable in the manner designated by the senate committee on rules and administration as to members of the senate and by the committee on rules and legislative administration as to members of the house of representatives.

The expense allowances provided for herein to the persons designated are in lieu of any other expenses authorized by law or resolution for the same purposes.

- Sec. 84. [170.231] ABSTRACT FEE. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary the fee for a certified abstract of operating record as described in Minnesota Statutes 1969, Section 170.23 is \$2.50.
- Sec. 85. Student workers and service workers appointed on an unlimited basis may be employed by the commissioner of public welfare but shall be included in the approved complement. When appointed on a limited basis, they may be in addition to the approved complement. Both types of appointments shall be subject to the approval of the commissioner of administration.
- Sec. 86. The appropriation made in Laws 1971, Chapter 702, Section 25, is to be made from the general fund.
- Sec. 87. [16.139] REIMBURSEMENT FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE TO STATE PROPERTY, USE OF PROCEEDS. Notwithstanding the provision of any other law, any state department or agency that receives a reimbursement for the loss or damage to state property may deposit the reimbursement in the current year's account. Such reimbursement is hereby reappropriated for the purpose of replacing or repairing the state property.
- Sec. 88. [87.025] WHEN LANDOWNER'S LIABILITY NOT LIMITED. Subdivision 1. Nothing in Minnesota Statutes 1969, Chapter 87, as amended, limits in any way any liability which otherwise exists:

- (a) For conduct which, at law, entitles a trespasser to maintain an action and obtain relief for the conduct complained of;
- (b) For injury suffered in any case where the owner of land charges the person or persons who enter or go on the land for the recreational use thereof, except that in the case of land leased to the state or a subdivision thereof, any consideration received from the state or subdivision thereof by the owner for such lease shall not be deemed a charge within the meaning of this section.
 - Subd. 2. Laws 1971, Chapter 946, Section 6, is repealed.
- Sec. 89. There is appropriated to the commissioner of administration from the appropriate funds in the state treasury such sums as may be necessary to pay increases in compensation of officers, department heads, and other individuals in the judicial, executive, and legislative branches of the state government, all in the unclassified service, if such salary increases are otherwise authorized by law during the 1971 special session of the legislature. The commissioner shall certify the necessary amounts to the state auditor, who shall transfer such amounts to the appropriate accounts. Sums so certified and transferred are hereby reappropriated. The appropriation made by this section is for the biennium beginning July 1, 1971.
- Sec. 90. The appropriation contained in Laws 1971, Chapter 848, Section 6, are the only state funds to be expended for the purposes of that act and shall be used only for the purpose of making grants.
- Sec. 91. The appropriation contained in Laws 1971, Chapter 634, is for the biennium beginning July 1, 1971.
- Sec. 92. Provided that the expenditure of funds appropriated by Laws 1971, Chapter 961, Section 2, Subdivision 15, shall be disbursed by making an initial payment on or before October 1, 1971, for fiscal year 1972 and on or before October 1, 1972, for fiscal year 1973. Final payments shall be made before October 1 of the following fiscal year.
- Sec. 93. There is hereby appropriated \$175,000 for the biennium beginning July 1, 1971, to the commissioner of corrections for the purposes of Laws 1971, Chapter 782.

- Sec. 94. [245.692] [subd. 2.] DEFINITION. Subdivision 1. For the purposes of Laws 1971, Chapter 892, Section 1, a detoxification center is defined as a social rehabilitation facility established for the purpose of facilitating access into care and rehabilitation by detoxifying and evaluating the person and providing entrance into the continuum of care. Such facility shall be under medical supervision and shall have available the services of a licensed physician for medical emergencies.
- Subd. 2. Laws 1971, Chapter 892, Section 1, Subdivision 2, is repealed.
- Sec. 95. [171.071] IDENTIFICATION IN LIEU OF PHOTOGRAPHS. Notwithstanding the provisions of Minnesota Statutes, Section 171.07, the commissioner of public safety may adopt regulations to permit identification on a driver's license in lieu of a photograph where the commissioner finds that the licensee has religious objections to the use of a photograph.
- Sec. 96. [85.015] [subd. 9.] Notwithstanding the provisions of Laws 1971, Chapter 859, Section 6, Subdivision 1, authorizing the commissioner of natural resources to acquire lands by gift or purchase for trails and facilities relating to trails, nonetheless, all such lands acquired shall be acquired by the commissioner of administration for the commissioner of natural resources.
- Sec. 97. [3.25] APPROPRIATIONS NOT DISCLOSING SOURCE. Whenever moneys are appropriated from the state treasury and the appropriation does not disclose the source thereof, the appropriation is from the general fund.
- Sec. 98. [16.07] [subd. 14.] REJECTION OF BIDS. The commissioner of administration may reject all bids for electronic data processing equipment, related equipment and software and may negotiate a contract for said equipment if he finds such bids to be unsatisfactory, providing that such negotiated price shall not be more than the lowest responsible bid.

- Sec. 99. If the monies in the wildlife acquisition account are insufficient to meet option expiration dates, additional funds as needed may be temporarily transferred by order of the commissioner of administration from any available monies in the game and fish fund. The state auditor shall transfer upon receipt of the commissioner's certification the amount so certified. The sums transferred are hereby appropriated for the purposes certified. Any funds transferred shall be returned to the game and fish fund prior to January 1, 1972.

- (a) to provide space therein by lease or other arrangement to tax supported and other non-profit educational institutions for school, classroom, or other educational use, or use in protection of public health; or
 - (b) as an historic monument; and
- (c) whether or not used as in (a) or (b), for such other use, private and public, as may be compatible with the conditions and restrictions of the grant, permissible under controlling law and regulation governing the use under the grant, and in accord with the purpose of the corporation.
- Subd. 3. Subdivision 2 takes the place of Laws 1971, Chapter 605, Section 3, Subdivision 4, which subdivision is hereby repealed.
- Subd. 4. [4.077] [subd. 5] to operate and maintain and furnish, restore, and as needed or suitable from time to time, renovate and remodel the courts building; and to accomplish its purpose and in execution of its powers, to borrow money and is-

sue its debentures payable from income either unsecured or secured by pledge of revenues to be derived from the operation of its property or from other sources, or both, and to agree, if in consonance with national policy, that income derived from property conveyed to it by federal authority in excess of costs of repair, rehabilitation, restoration, and maintenance will be used by it only for park or recreational purposes, and to fulfill such agreement; and in its corporate discretion to use any such excess income which has not been so committed for park or recreation purposes, or for educational purposes by supporting educational institutions or activity, or for both of such purposes, and generally to do any and all lawful acts necessary or appropriate to carry out the purposes for which it is created.

Subd. 5. Subdivision 4 takes the place of Laws 1971, Chapter 605, Section 6, Clause (l), which clause is hereby repealed.
