An act fixing the salaries of the members of the water, light, power and building commission in certain fourth class cities.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Utilities commission, salaries of members, certain city fourth class. In all cities of the fourth class, however organized, of this state, now or hereafter having an assessed valuation of more than \$1,500,000, more than 70 percent of which is made up of valuation of iron ore, and which have a population of not less than 1,200 nor more than 1,400 inhabitants, according to the last federal census. the salary of each member of the water, light, power and building commission of such city may be fixed at \$15 per month, starting with January 1, 1954. If any such city within this state comes within this classification, it shall not thereafter cease to be governed by the provisions of this section, notwithstanding any change in valuation or population.

CHAPTER 389-H. F. No. 1618

An act relating to the appointing of members of the county board to all boards or commissions established by law in any county of this state now or hereafter having over 150,000 inhabitants and an area of over 5,000 square miles.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. St. Louis county, board members serving on commissions and other boards. In any county now or hereafter having over 150,000 inhabitants and an area of over 5,000 square miles, the county board may elect for a term of one year one of its members to serve on any commission or any other board, except the civil service commission and sanatorium commission, now or hereafter created by law within the county and having charge of or jurisdiction over any county activities or institution supported in whole or in part by county tax revenues. This act shall not repeal or modify any act now in force pertaining to commissions or boards now having county board members.
