Any member who retires with a deferred an-Subd. 4. nuity payable pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 1953, Chapter 353, as amended by Laws 1955, Chapter 815, may select an optional annuity payable as a joint and survivor annuity which shall be in lieu of the straight life deferred annuity otherwise payable. This optional annuity shall be the actuarial equivalent of such straight life deferred annuity. The selection of this optional annuity shall be made at least 30 days before the deferred annuity payments are to begin except that any person who began receiving a deferred annuity after June 30, 1957, and before July 1, 1961, pursuant to Minnesota Statutes 1953, Chapter 353, as amended by Laws 1955, Chapter 815, may select the optional annuity provided herein by making application to the board of trustees before January 1, 1962.

An act relating to the administration of state government; appropriating moneys therefor and limiting the use thereof; providing for the transfer of certain moneys in the state treasury; adjusting the salaries of certain state officers and employees; authorizing land acquisition by gift, purchase, or condemnation in certain cases; limiting the amount of fees to be collected for deposit in the state treasury; and providing penalties for misusing funds appropriated hereby.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Materials purchased to be used in the manufacture of motor vehicle number plates for the state shall be tested as to conformance with specifications established by the secretary of state and the division of purchases in a privately operated laboratory to be designated by the division of purchases. The cost of such laboratory service shall be included in the cost of the materials pur-chased. The expenses of the state reformatory for men in manufacturing number plates under Laws 1957, Chapter 412, shall include the cost of the delivery of such number plates to the secretary of state at the places which he may designate. Notwithstanding any other provision of this act or of any other law, the appropriations made in subdivision 7, c. for the 1962 and 1963 all be available for allotment, encumbrance and expenditure from and after the passage of this act. All materials and all equipment used in the manufacture of such number plates shall be approved by the commissioner of administration. Notwithstanding any provision in Laws 1957, Chapter 412, to the contrary, whenever the state reformatory for men shall certify to the commissioner of administration that expenses have been incurred for material, labor and any additional equipment

which may have been purchased for the manufacture of number plates, the commissioner of administration may, even though a number plate order has not been completed, approve the certifica-tion and direct the auditor and treasurer to pay such expenses or to reimburse the state reformatory for men therefor from the moneys appropriated hereby. If the division of purchases incurs expenses for material or for any additional equipment which may have been purchased for the manufacture of number plates, the commissioner of administration may in a like manner direct the auditor and treasurer to pay such expenses.

The moneys appropriated by subdivision 7, items a., b., and c. are hereby appropriated from the highway user tax distribution fund. None of such appropriations are chargeable against the revenue fund.

Items a and b include necessary expenses of a board of grain standards, which board is hereby created. It shall consist of the chief grain inspector, appointed pursuant to M.S., Section 233.17, and the chief deputy inspectors of Minneapolis and Duluth, appointed pursuant to M.S. Section 233.18. This board shall have jurisdiction over all grain standards now or hereafter established in Minnesota. It shall meet annually on or before June 15, and establish grades of all grain subject to state inspection, which shall be known as the "Minnesota grades", and all grain received at any public warehouse shall be graded accordingly. Such grades shall not be changed befor the next annual meeting with-out the concurrence of at least two members of the board. At the time of establishing "Minne-sota grades" it shall be the duty of such board to establish such rules and regulations as such board shall deem necessary for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of Minnesota Statutes 1957, Sections 233,135 to 233,137; and shall publish such rules and regulations in such manner as the railroad and warehouse commission shall approve. In establishing the grades, in addition to the physical qualities of the grain, there shall be taken into consideration the milling and bread-producing

quality of all grain products used as human food.

The board of grain appeals, as constituted immediately prior to the enactment of this act, is hereby abolished.

For the purpose of computing payment of overtime, employees of the grain inspection division shall be compensated for each week's work on the following basis: For time worked up to 40 hours, regular salary; for time worked in excess of 40 hours in any one week, one and one-half times his regular salary, provided, however, that no employee shall receive overtime for any one day except for time worked in excess of 10 hours in that day, or until he has worked 40 hours in that week, except that such employee shall receive one and one-half times his regular salary for time worked on Sundays and regular holidays, irrespective of the number of hours worked during any one day, or during said week. The Commission is directed to adjust its schedule of fees before the end of each fiscal year to provide that the initial charge made for services to be rendered during the next fiscal year shall be sufficient to provide an income during the latter fiscal year equal to the amount of the appropriation for that year for salaries, overtime, expenses, which shall include, without limitation an amount for state retirement and social security contri-butions. If the income from the fees provided for herein during any fiscal year shall be more than 103 percent of such appropriation for that year, the Commission, in adjusting its schedule of fees for use in the next fiscal year, shall fix the fees to produce income in the amount of such appropriation less the amount of such excess over 103 percent of

the appropriation first referred to herein. If the income from the fees provided for herein during any fiscal year shall be less than the appropriation for that year, the Commission, in adjusting its schedule of fees for use in the next fiscal year, shall fix the fees to produce income in the amount of the appropriation for the lat-ter year plus the amount of the difference between the appropriation for the year first referred to herein and the total income from such fees during that year, and plus 3 percent of the total appropriation for both the latter and first year referred to herein. Such schedule of fees shall provide that any elevator, mill or other commission business requesting the service of a weigher, shall pay a minimum charge of \$1.75 per hour for each weigher requested or assigned. Any fees earned by such weigher shall be credited against the charge made therefor. Such minimum charge shall be assessed only after taking into consideration all fees earned and all hours charged. Excess fees earned over hours charged shall be carried forward from month to month during any one fiscal year. When deemed necessary by the chief of grain inspection, a charge for actual overtime costs may be made.

No state department, bureau or division, whether the same operates on funds appropriated or receipts or fees of any nature whatsoever, except the highway department, the game and fish division and the division of employment security shall use any of such funds for the payment of the salary or expenses of a publicity representative. The head of any such department, bureau or division shall be personally liable for funds used contrary to this provision. This act shall not be construed, however, as preventing any such department, bureau or division from sending out any bulletins or other publicity required by any state law or necessary for the satisfactory conduct of the business for which such department, bureau or division was created.
- Sec. 55. Notwithstanding any provision in this act to the contrary, the appropriations for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1961 which are to be expended for motor vehicles may be encumbered for such purposes prior to such date so that the motor vehicles may be delivered to the state by such date. Motor vehicles of the Game Warden Service shall have printed thereon the markings required by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 168.012, as amended, for tax exempt vehicles.
- Sec. 56. Legislative advisory committee. Subdivision. 1. Whenever it becomes necessary in order to

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meet the current demands upon the revenue fund for the payment of warrants issued or to be issued against said fund pursuant to appropriations, the governor after securing the recommendation of the legislative advisory committee. which shall be advisory only, or if there be no such committee, the governor, the state auditor, and the state treasurer, as a special committee, at any time prior to June 30, 1963, may authorize the issuance and sale of certificates of indebtedness of the state, payable out of said revenue fund, in such amount as may be necessary to pay such warrants; such certificates to be signed by the state treasurer, attested and recorded by the state auditor, and to be numbered serially and to be of such denomination and bear such dates of issue and of maturity and such rate of interest as the governor or such special committee shall determine; provided, that no such certificate shall mature after the current fiscal year, and provided further, that the aggregate amount of such certificate at any time outstanding shall never exceed \$26,000,000. The failure or refusal of the advisory committee. if there be one, to make a recommendation promptly shall be deemed a negative recommendation. If such funds are not available to retire any such certificate at maturity, the same may be refunded by the issuance of new certificates or may be extended by agreement with the holders thereof. Certificates issued and sold pursuant to the authorization of this act shall be retired out of the receipts of the revenue fund appropriated to the payment of the warrants issued against said fund but taken up with the proceeds of such certificates.

Subd. 2. The state board of investment, or its successor in authority, is hereby authorized to purchase the certificates of indebtedness herein authorized for any fund which it is authorized to invest, provided, it shall not purchase any such certificates bearing interest at a rate of less than one and one-half percent per annum.

Sec. 57. Transfer of funds, state auditor. The state auditor is hereby authorized and directed to transfer to the general revenue fund in the state treasury, all moneys credited to any fund established in connection with the payment of certificates of indebtedness—when the purposes for which the act authorizing such certificates have been accomplished.

Subdivision 1. There is hereby transferred to the gen-

eral revenue fund the following sums to reimburse the general revenue fund for amounts transferred out of the general contingent fund for the following purposes, for the following years:

- a. Income tax school fund for the department of education supplies and expense for the year ending June 30, 1961\$14,606

- Subd. 2. There is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund the sum of \$585,149.59 to reimburse the general revenue fund for the cost of collecting the tax on gasoline and gasoline substitutes and the cost of bond premiums during the 1959-61 biennium, from the highway user tax distribution fund.

There is hereby transferred from the general revenue fund the sum of \$2,247.58 to correct an overestimate in the cost of collecting the tax on gasoline and gasoline substitutes during the 1957-59 biennium, the sum to be transferred to the highway user tax distribution fund. The provisions of subdivision 2 shall take effect upon passage of this act.

There is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund the sum of \$34,779.69 to reimburse the general revenue fund for functions performed by the office of the state treasurer in mailing gas tax refunds during the 1959-61 biennium, from the highway user tax distribution fund.

- Subd. 3. All unexpended and unemcumbered moneys in or which may hereafter accrue to the veterans' compensation fund in the state treasury are hereby transferred to the general revenue fund in the state treasury.
- Subd. 4. All moneys collected for the teachers' retirement fund pursuant to the annual state tax levies therefor made prior to December 31, 1957; and in excess of the amount certified to the state auditor by the teachers' retirement board as the amount needed to meet the state's obligations is hereby transferred to the general revenue fund in the state treasury.

Sec. 58. Merit increases. Notwithstanding any provision of Minnesota Statutes 1957, Chapter 43, as amended to the contrary, moneys appropriated by this act or any other appropriation law may be expended for merit increases and for longevity increases only in accordance with the following:

Merit increases and longevity increases shall not be granted during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1962, except that one merit or longevity increase may be granted to those persons who do not receive a pay increase by reason of the adoption of the civil service pay plan filed with the commissioner of administration to become effective on July 1, 1961.

These merit or longevity increases may be financed solely from departmental savings

One merit increase for each eligible position below the maximum of its range, or one longevity increase above the maximum may be granted for each eligible position during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1963.

The moneys for the payment of the merit or longevity increases authorized shall be financed as follows:

In departments having from 1 to 20 employees, sufficient moneys are provided by this act for the payment of the authorized merit and longevity increases.

In departments having from 21 to 50 employees, 75 percent of the moneys required have been provided in this act for the payment of authorized merit and longevity increases; the remaining 25 percent may be financed from departmental savings.

In departments having from 51 to 100 employees, 50 percent of the moneys required have been provided in this act for the payment of authorized merit and longevity increases; the remaining 50 percent may be financed from departmental savings.

In departments having from 101 and over employees, 40 percent of the moneys required have been provided in this act for the payment of authorized merit and longevity increases; the remaining 60 percent may be financed from departmental savings.

When a position at the maximum is vacated, an additional amount equal to one merit increase is available there-

for to be expended only at the times prescribed in the previous paragraphs.

Merit increases granted pursuant to this section shall be on the basis of established standards, but in no event to exceed one merit increase per eligible employee per fiscal year.

None of the moneys appropriated by this act or by any other law shall be expended during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1962, for economic salary adjustments notwithstanding the provisions of law relating thereto to the contrary.

- Sec. 59. None of the moneys appropriated by this act or any other appropriation law shall be expended in paying state officers or employees in the unclassified service for unused portions of annual leave allowances provided for by M.S. 1957, Section 351.12 for any greater period of time than is permitted state officers or employees in the classified service.
- Sec. 60. Approved complements. Whenever an appropriation to any state department or agency for salaries discloses an approved complement, that department or agency, except for seasonal and part time employees, is limited in the employment of the number of persons indicated by such approved complement. The employment of seasonal and part time employees shall be in addition to the approved complement but subject to the approval of the commissioner of administration who shall determine the need therefor.

Additional employees over the number of the approved complement may be employed on the basis of public necessity or emergency with the written approval of the governor, but the governor shall not approve such additional personnel until he has consulted with the legislative advisory committee created by Laws 1943, Chapter 594, and such committee has made its recommendation upon the matter. Such recommendation shall be advisory only. Failure or refusal of the committee to make a recommendation promptly shall be deemed a negative recommendation. The provisions hereof shall extend to any other agency to which the present authority of the legislative advisory committee may be transferred, but shall be deemed to be repealed in case such authority shall be abolished.

Sec. 61. Limitations on appropriations. All the foregoing appropriations herein contained are to be ex-

pended subject to the provisions of Laws 1939, Chapter 431. No appropriation shall become available for expenditure until such estimates as required by Section 16, Article II, of such act shall have been approved by the commissioner of administration. No obligation involving expenditure of money shall be entered into unless there is a balance in the appropriation available not otherwise encumbered to pay obligations previously incurred.

- Sec. 62. Furniture purchases from state reformatory. Provided, insofar is practicable, all furniture to be purchased by state departments from moneys made available in this act, shall be procured from the state reformatory for men, notwithstanding any other provisions to the contrary.
- Sec. 63. None of the moneys appropriated by this act or any other law shall be expended in making any refund where the amount thereof is \$1.00 or less.
- Sec. 64. [16.80] Central services revolving fund created. There is appropriated to the commissioner of administration annually all moneys in the central services revolving fund in the state treasury, which fund is hereby created. The following enumerated items are hereby transferred to and deposited in such revolving fund:

\$5,000 from the state institutions contingent fund (in 1918) for the purposes of Laws 1917, Chapter 174.

\$5,000 from the state institutions contingent fund (in 1920) for the purposes of Laws 1917, Chapter 174.

\$15,000 by Laws 1941, Chapter 548, Sec. 22 (5).

\$20,000 by Extra Session Laws 1951, Chapter 1, Sec. 24 (3).

\$17,500 by Laws 1957, Chapter 929, Sec. 17 (6) and fees of the commissioner of administration for copies of documents and records appropriated by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 16.026.

\$10,000 from the General Contingent Fund to the state department revolving fund on June 7, 1960.

\$30,000 for the Minnesota administrative rules revolv-

ing fund by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 15.047, Subdivision 3.

\$1,500 for a revolving fund for republishing the official state capitol guide books and history by Laws 1937, Chapter 396.

\$250,000 for a state department revolving fund by Laws 1957, Chapter 929, Section 17 (11).

Deposits for postage obligations appropriated by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 16.56.

All fees prescribed by Laws 1955, Chapter 847, and other provisions of the law not inconsistent therewith for the rendering of the services therein provided shall be deposited in the state treasury by the collecting department or agency and credited to the central services revolving fund.

All moneys in the state treasury credited to the central services revolving fund and any moneys which may hereafter be deposited therein are hereby appropriated annually to the commissioner of administration for the following purposes:

- (a) The operation of a central store and equipment service;
- (b) The operation of a central duplication and reproduction service;
- (c) The purchase of postage and related items, and the refund of postage deposits, necessary to the operation of a central mailing service;
- (d) The operation of a documents service as prescribed by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 16.026;
- (e) The publication of administrative rules and regulations as prescribed by Minnesota Statutes 1957, Section 15.047:
- (f) The publication of the official state capitol guide books and history as prescribed by Laws 1937, Chapter 396, as amended;
- (g) The performing of services for any other state department or agency in conformity with Laws 1957, Chapter 929, Section 17 (11).

Except as specifically provided for by other statutory

provisions, each department or agency shall reimburse the central services revolving fund for the cost of all services, supplies, materials, labor and depreciation of equipment including reasonable overhead costs which the commissioner of administration is authorized and directed to furnish a department or agency. The cost of all publications or any other materials which may be produced by the commissioner of administration and financed from the central services revolving fund shall include reasonable overhead costs. The state auditor shall make appropriate transfers to the central services revolving fund when requested by the commissioner of administration. The commissioner of administration may make allotments, encumbrances, and disbursements in anticipation of such transfers. All such reimbursements and any other moneys received by the commissioner of administration under this act shall be deposited in the central services revolving fund.

Sec. 65. Notwithstanding the provisions of any other law to the contrary, the salaries of the state officers enumerated in this section and payable from the appropriations made by this act and other appropriation laws shall be fixed by the appointing authority but shall not exceed the following:

An act relating to the operations of state government; appropriating moneys for education and related purposes, including the University of Minnesota and its hospitals, aids to rural libraries, junior colleges, for a school construction loan program, the payment of agricultural agents, and limiting and regulating the use thereof; providing aid to school districts including those affected by gross earnings taxation and authorizing borrowing by school districts in anticipation of taxes and state aids; authorizing the power of eminent domain with certain of the funds provided hereby; transferring moneys between accounts and funds in the state treasury; controlling certain treasury receipts; and imposing conditions relative to the expenditure of public moneys.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Educational purposes, appropriations. Except as herein otherwise provided, the sums hereinafter set forth in the columns designated "APPROPRIATIONS", or so much thereof as may be necessary, are hereby appropriated out of the general revenue fund in the state treasury for the purposes specified in the following sections of this act, to be available for the fiscal years indicated for each purpose.
