NUMBER XXI.

A Memorial to Congress for an appropriation for the improvement of the Mississippi River from the mouth of the Minnesota River to Sauk Rapids.

To the Honorable the Senate and House of representatives in Congress Assembled:

Your Memoralists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Minnesota respectfully represent,

That the navigation of the Mississippi River, between the mouth of the Minnesota or St. Peters River and the Falls of St. Anthony, a distance of about seven miles by the river, is during the season of low water, obstructed by rocks and other impediments which a moderate appropriation, judiciously expended, would remove and render the navigation of said river between the points above named, free to the largest class of Steamboats used upon the Upper Mississippi and other water crafts during the entire season of navigation.

That within the two years last past, the citizens of St. Anthony and Minneapolis have expended for the improvement. of the navigation of said river, between the points aforesaid, Memorial to Com-about ten thousand dollars, and during last season a line of boats was established between the places aforesaid and Fulton City, and during the season fifty-two steamboats arrived at the landing at St. Anthony and Minneapolis, leaving nearly six thousand tons of freight, which however is a small quantity compared with what would have been landed there, had boats been able to run the whole season of navigation.

Your memorialists further represent that the navigation of the Mississippi River between the Falls of St. Anthony and Sauk Rapids, a distance of about eighty miles, is during the time of low water obstructed by rocks, with a moderate appropriation properly expended, would remove and enableboats to run there during the entire season of navigation.

The benefits government would derive from the improvements above contemplated, would far exceed the amount required to remove the obstacles to the free navigation of said Large quantities of goods and supplies are annually transported by the government at great expense, over a long and tedious land route, to furnish the different nations and tribes of Indians in the northern and western portions of the Territory, and also the military forces stationed at Fort Ripley and the fort at Pembina, which expense would be materially lessened were the improvements herein prayed for

For the past three years two steamboats have been running on the river above the Falls during the time of high water, but such navigation is obstructed about half of the summer.

The rapid increase in population and importance of St. Anthony and Minneapolis and many other towns on the Upper Mississippi, and the fast increasing settlements of that section of the country, are further reasons which are respectfully urged as rendering such improvements expedient and necessary.

Your Memoralists therefore ask that an appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars be made for the improvement of that portion of said river below the Falls of St. Anthony above mentioned, and the further sum of forty thousand dollars to improve the same between said Falls and Sauk Rapids. case your honorable body should not think [proper] to appropriate money, then we respectfully ask that lands equal in value be donated for the purposes aforesaid.

And your Memorialists will ever pray.

The Memorial of the Legislature of the State Minnesota respectfully represents that in order to fully develop and open out to settlement the beautiful country between the Rocky Mountains and Lake Superior, there should be a good Momorial to Con-Wagon Road constructed the entire distance, and believing green for an apit is the earnest desire of Congress to aid this new and propriation thriving State, and in view of the fact that Congress has already appropriated a certain sum towards the object herein sought, your memorialists respectfully ask your honorable body to further appropriate the sum of fifty thousand dollars, to construct a Wagon Road from some point on Lake Superior, in this State, to Fort Ridgley. Also, the sum of one hundred thousand dollars to aid in the construction of a Road from that point on the Missouri River, where the Road recently laid out by the Department of the Interior, under the superintendence of Wm. H. Nobles, strikes said river, thence by the most direct and feasible route to the South Pass of the Rocky Mountains.
