CHAPTER XXI.

An Act prohibiting the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors to Indians.

- SECTION 1. Penalty for selling intoxicating liquors to Indians.
 - 2. Justices of the Peace to have power to determine such cases.
 - 3. Indians to be competent witnesses in such cases.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. Any person who shall sell, exchange, or give, barter or dispose of any intoxicating or spirituous liquors or wine to an Indian, whether within the Indian country or without the limits thereof and within this State, shall be punished by Penalty for sell-imprisonment in the county jail, not more that three months ling liquor to Innor less than twenty days, or by fine not exceeding one hundred dians (100) dollars nor less than twenty-five (25) dollars, or by

both such imprisonment and fine; and every person so offend-

ing shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

SEC. 2. Justices of the Peace throughout the State shall Justices to hear have full and complete jurisdiction to hear, try, and determine and determine of all offenses committed under the provisions of this Act, within the limits of their proper county.

"But no session shall exceed the term of sixty days."
