To the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America:

We would therefore ask of your honorable body to extend the benefits of the Pension Law, passed at your session 1861—'62, to all persons permanently disabled by wounds received in said raid, and to all widows or families who may have lost their husbands or fathers in said war, in all respects as if said persons had been killed or wounded in the military service of the United

States.
