26th.—For pay of messenger of the executive department, one hundred and twenty dollars.

## CHAPTER CXVIII.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR THE GENERAL EXPENSES OF THE STATE GOVERNMENT FOR THE YEAR EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-THREE.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:*

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be and the same are hereby appropriated out of any money in the state treasury belonging to the general revenue fund, not otherwise appropriated, for the general expenses of the state government for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-three, hereinafter specified, viz:

Appropriation for general expenses.

1st.—For executive contingent fund for state purposes and for incidental expenses of the governor's office, three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

Executive contingent.

2d.—For incidental expenses of the secretary's office, four hundred dollars (\$400).

Secretary's contingent.

3d.—For incidental expenses of the state auditor's office, four hundred dollars (\$400).

Auditor's contingent.

4th.—For incidental expenses of the state treasurer's office, four hundred dollars (\$400).

Treasurer's contingent.

5th.—For incidental expenses and mileage and per diem of the attorney general, as allowed by law, for the prosecution of offenders, one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

Att'y. General's contingent.

6th.—For incidental expenses of the superintendent of public instruction, five hundred dollars (\$500).

Supt. of Public Instruction contingent.

7th.—For incidental expenses and clerk hire of the railroad commissioner, one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

R. R. Commissioner's contingent.

- 8th.—For incidental expenses of the adjutant general, three hundred dollars (\$300). Adj't General's contingent.
- 9th.—For incidental expenses of the state library, four hundred dollars (\$400). Library's contingent.
- 10th.—For incidental expenses of the supreme court, five hundred dollars (\$500). Supreme courts contingent.
- 11th.—For two hundred copies of volume eighteen supreme court reports, twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200). Vol. XVIII. Minn. Reports.
- 12th.—For purchase of law books for the state library, under the direction of the judges of the supreme court, eight hundred dollars (\$800). Purchase of law books.
- 13th.—For printing, advertising, publishing laws in newspapers, and binding for the various offices and departments, eighteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$18,500). Public printing.
- 14th.—For the purchase of paper necessary for the public printing, six thousand dollars (\$6,000). Paper for public printing.
- 15th.—For preparing for publication the general and special laws and journals and indexing the same, six hundred dollars (\$600). Laws and journals.
- 16th.—For the payment of interest on state loans, thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000). Interest.
- 17th.—For conveying convicts to prison and returning absconding criminals, three thousand dollars (\$3,000). Transportation of criminals.
- 18th.—For selecting, appraising and selling state lands, two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.) Appraising state lands.
- 19th.—For repairs of state capitol and grounds, four thousand dollars (\$4,000). Repairs of capitol
- 20th.—For heating and lighting the legislative halls and the several state offices, three thousand dollars (\$3,000). Heating and lighting capitol.
- 21st.—For support of the Minnesota state historical society, twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500). Historical society
- 22d.—For express charges and mileage of county treasurers in the conveyance of state funds, three hundred dollars (\$300). Conveying state funds.
- 23d.—For rent of state arsenal, five hundred and fifty dollars (\$550). Rent of arsenal.
- 24th.—For rent of house for use of the governor, eight hundred dollars (\$800). Rent of house for Governor.
- 25th.—For expenses locating university lands under the provisions of the act of July eighth, eighteen hundred and seventy, five hundred dollars (\$500). Locating university lands.
- 26th.—For payment of Pennock Pusey for clerical services rendered board of presidential electors, twenty dollars (\$20). Clerk of board of electors.
- 27th.—For two hundred copies of supreme court re-

Medical commis- sion. 28th.—For pay of medical commission to examine prisoner Peter Woertz, confined in Carver county jail under sentence of death, one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150).

Statistician's sal- ary. 29th.—For the salary of the commissioner of statistics, one thousand dollars (\$1,000.)

Prison reform congress. 30th.—For expenses of commissioners appointed by governor to attend national prison reform congress, three hundred dollars.

H. Petshold. 31st.—To H. Petzold, for salary as clerk in the adju- tant general's office during the war, eleven hundred and twenty-one dollars (\$1,121); *Provided*, That no money shall be paid out of the treasury of this state for this claim until the same is allowed and paid by the general government of the United States.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

## CHAPTER CXIX.

### AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY FOR CURRENT EXPENSES AND SALARIES OF OFFICERS OF THE STATE PRISON.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:*

Appropriation for state prison— salaries and cur- rent expenses.

SECTION 1. That the following sums of money, or as much thereof as may be necessary for current expenses and salaries of officers, be and the same are hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not other- wise appropriated:

*First.* The sum of twenty-five thousand dollars for current expenses, and twelve thousand dollars for salaries of officers, the same to be paid in warrants drawn by the president and countersigned by the clerk of board of in- spectors of said institution, and upon presentation of said warrants on the state auditor, it shall be his duty to draw
