ty," approved March 1, 1872, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 3. That Joseph Fortier, Lewis Burdewick and Ole Dahly are bereby appointed a committee on the part of the state to view said bridge when completed, and examine all contrates, vouchers and accounts respecting its construction, and the cost thereof, and to ascertain, (compute) complete, and fix upon the cost of building said bridge, and make a report of such cost to the state auditor. Any two of said committee may act in the premises, and in case of any two of said committee cannot be found to, or refuse to act, the county auditor of said county of Yellow Medicine shall notify the governor of the state of Minnesota of such fact within the period of three months after the passage of this act, who shall by appointment fill any vacancy that may exist in said committee.

SEC. 2. This act shall be in force from and after its passage. Approved March 1, 1873,

CHAPTER CXXXIV.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY TO AID THE COUNTY OF GRANT IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF A BRIDGE ACROSS THE POMME DE TERRE RIVER IN SAID COUNTY.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the sum of five hundred dollars, or as much thereot as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any money in the state treasury belonging to the internal improvement fund, or out of the first money that may come into the treasury belonging to said fund not otherwise appropriated, to build a substantial bridge across Pomme de Terre river at a point where the state road running from Alexandria to Fort Abercrombie crosses said river in town number one hundred and thirty, range forty-two, in the county of Grant, and said bridge when completed shall be kept in repair by said county, and shall forever be free from toll.

SEC. 2. Said bridge shall be built under the direction of the board of county commissioners of the county of Grant, and no part of said appropriation shall be paid out of the state treasury until said bridge is completed and ready for travel. SEC. 3. The governor shall appoint three persons, citizens of Grant county, as a committee on the part of the state, to view said bridge when completed, and examine all contracts, vouchers and accounts respecting its construction and the cost thereof, and fix the cost of said bridge, and make report of the same to the state auditor.

SEO. 4. That upon the receipt of said report by the state auditor he shall draw his order in favor of said county of Grant on the state treasury for the cost of said bridge not to exceed five hundred dollars. The state treasurer shall pay over such money to the county treasurer of Grant county upon the presentation of such order or orders, and such money shall be paid out by the county treasurer upon the order of the board of county commissioners in payment of the cost of said bridge.

SEC. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER CXXXV.

AN ACT TO APPROPRIATE MONEY TO BUILD A BRIDGE ACROSS THE ZUMBRO RIVER IN THE TOWN OF ORONOCO, OLMSTED COUNTY.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the sum of two thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the state treasury belonging to the internal improvement fund, or out of the first moneys which shall come into the treasury belonging to said fund not already appropriated, to build a substantial bridge across the Zumbro river in the town of Oronoco, Olmsted county, at or near the place where the old territorial road running from Minneiska to Oronoco via Plainview crosses said Zumbro river, and said bridge when completed shall be kept in repair by said town, and be forever free from toll.

SEC. 2. That said bridge shall be built under the direction of the board of county commissioners of said Olmsted county, and no part of said appropriation shall be paid out of the state treasury until said bridge shall be completed and ready for travel.
