CHAPTER 38.

AN ACT TO AMEND SECTION ELEVEN (11) OF CHAPTER NINETY ONE (91) OF THE GENERAL LAWS OF ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-SEVEN (1877), BEING AN ACT RELATING TO DITCHES OR DRAINS.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Ditch or drain to be extended —when. Section 1. That section eleven (11) of chapter ninety-one (91) of the General Laws of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven (1877) be amended by the addition of the following words: "When it shall be necessary to extend any such ditch or drain as falls within the meaning of this act into more than one town, the supervisors of the town where the application is first filed, shall submit the same to the county commissioners of such county at the first subsequent meeting, and on being satisfied that such ditch or drain is a public necessity or accommodation, said commissioners shall direct the supervisors of the several towns to take measures for the construction or extension of such ditch in their respective towns, in conformity with the provisions of this act."

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and

after its passage.

CHAPTER 39.

AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER NINETY-FOUR (94) OF THE GENERAL LAWS ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HONDRED AND SEVENTY-SIX (1876), ENTITLED AN ACT PROVIDING FOR A STATE BOUNTY FOR THE DESTRUCTION OF WOLVES.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

Section 1. That chapter ninety-four (94) of the General Laws of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-six (1876)

be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Time for presentation of scalp—oath.

Section 1. Any person who shall kill any wolf in this State, shall be entitled to receive a bounty of three dollars; and any person claiming such bounty shall produce the head of the wolf so killed with the ears and scalp thereon entire, within twenty days after such wolf has been killed, to the County Auditor, or in his absence his clerk or the Clerk of the Court of the county in which said wolf was killed, and shall make oath or affirmation in writing before such auditor, his
