brant, in said county of Freeborn, between the first day of December,

and the first day of September of any year.

SEC. 3. That any person or persons violating any of the provisions of the preceding sections is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by fine not less than ten (10) dollars, nor more than twenty-five (25) dollars, together with costs of prosecution for each and every offence, or such violation, and in default of the payment of such fine and costs, he or they shall be committed to the county jail of the county, for a term not exceeding thirty days for every such offense or violation.

SEC. 4. That all prosecutions under the provisions of this act shall be commenced by complaint under oath, before any justice of the peace, or city justice in said county of Freeborn, within sixty days from the commission of such offense or violation of this act, and all fines collected under the provisions of this act, shall be paid, one-half (1/2) thereof to the complainant, and one-half (1/2) into the common

school fund of the county.

SEC. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 336.

[S. F. No. 329.]

AN ACT PREVENTING THE CATCHING OF FISH IN ANY OF THE WATERS OF STEELE; COUNTY, EXCEPT WITH HOOK AND LINE AND A TROLLING LINE.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Msnnesota:

SECTION 1 That it shall be unlawful for any person to take or catch any fish in any of the waters of Steele county in any other

manner than by the use of a trolling line, or rod and line.

SEC. 2. Any person violating the provisions of the foregoing section, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than one (\$1) dollar nor more than fifty (\$50) dollars, and in default of payment thereof may be imprisoned in the county jail not exceeding thirty (30) days.

SEC. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after

its passage.
