cil in the manner provided by chapter two hundred and twenty-seven (227) of the special laws of one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven (1887), entitled "an act to authorize and empower the common council of the city of Saint Paul to fill any vacancy occurring in the office of the justice of the peace in said city." On the day of the next general election in and for the city of Saint Paul and every two (2) years thereafter, there shall be elected by the qualified electors in the tenth (10th) and eleventh (11th) wards in said city a justice of the peace for said court who shall hold his office for two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 5. All acts and parts of acts inconsistent herewith are hereby

repealed.

Sec. 6. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 370.

[H. F. No. 1020.]

AN ACT ENTITLED AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE VILLAGE COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF SAINT LOUIS PARK, HENNEPIN COUNTY, MINNESOTA, TO APPROPRIATE FUNDS OUT OF THE VILLAGE TREASURY FOR SECURING BETTER TRANSPORTATION FACILITIES BETWEEN SAID VILLAGE AND THE CITY OF MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. That the village council of the village of Saint Louis Park, Hennepin county, Minnesota, be and the same is hereby authorized and fully empowered to appropriate out of any funds in the village treasury such sums as it may deem expedient, not exceeding the sum of one thousand (1,000) dollars, for the purpose of securing better transportation facilities between said village of Saint Louis Park and the city of Minneapolis, Hennepin county, Minnesota.

Provided, however, that said village council shall be theretofore duly authorized and empowered so to do, by at least seventy-five (75) per centum of the legal voters of the residents of said village, present and voting by ballot at a legally called special election for that purpose.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after:
