

CHAPTER 89.

Holidays.

An act to amend section one of chapter one hundred and twenty-four of the general statutes of one thousand eight hundred and seventy eight as amended relating to legal holidays.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Minnesota:

Legal holidays.

SECTION 1. That section one of chapter one hundred and twenty-four of the General Statutes of 1878 as amended is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 1. The twenty-second day of February, the anniversary of the birthday of Washington; the thirtieth day of May, known as memorial day; the first Monday in September, commonly known as labor day; and the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in each and every even-numbered year, being general election day, shall be observed in this state as legal holidays hereafter. No public business except in case of necessity shall be transacted on any one of said days, and no civil process shall be served on any of said days.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 90.

Penal code.

An act to amend section two hundred and fifty-nine of the penal code, relating to the crime of incest.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Minnesota:

Incest.

SECTION 1. That section two hundred and fifty-nine of the Penal Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 259. Incest—If any male and female persons who are nearer of kin to each other than first cousins, computing by the rules of the civil law, whether the half or the whole blood, have carnal sexual intercourse together, they shall each be guilty of the crime of incest and be punished by imprisonment in the state prison for not more than ten years. Provided that the provisions of this act shall not apply to any such offense committed prior to the passage of this act.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
