Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Minnesota:

Section 1. That section two hundred and forty-nine (249) of the penal code be and the same hereby is amended so as to read as follows, viz:

Whoever admits any person under the age of twenty- Any resort in-one (21) years, or allows them to remain in, any dance morals. house, or concert saloon, or place where intoxicating liquors are sold or given away, or any place of entertainment injurious to the morals, owned, kept or managed by him in whole or in part, unless such person under the age of twenty-one (21) years, is accompanied by its parent or guardian, is guilty of a misdemeanor. Any person who shall suffer or permit any such child to play any game of skill or chance in any such place is guilty of a misdemeanor.

CHAPTER 116.

H. F. No. 664.

An act to prohibit the use of tobacco by minor persons under eighteen (18) years of age, and by all minor or using of tobacco. Minor persons.

Prohibiting

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. Any person within this state who sells, gives to or in any way furnishes any cigarettes, cigars or tobacco in any form to any person under eighteen (18) years of age, or to any minor pupil in any school, college or university, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed fifty (50) dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed thirty (30) days for each offense.

SEC. 2. Any person under eighteen (18) years of age, or any minor pupil as described in section one (1) of use of tobacco this act, who shall smoke or use cigarettes, cigars or tobacco in any form on any public highway, street,
