Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

## CHAPTER 241.

H. F. No. 207.

An act permitting all ex-union soldiers and sailors, Ex-Union soldiers honorably discharged from the military or marine service and of the United States, the right to wend, hawk and peddle goods, wares, fruits or merchandise not prohibited by law. in any county, town, village, incorporated city or municipality in the State of Minnesota.

Ex-Union

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION I. That all ex-union soldiers and sailors, Permitted to preddle honorably discharged from the military or marine service without license. of the United States, shall be permitted to vend, hawk and peddle goods, wares, fruits or merchandise not prohibited by law, in any county, town, village, incorporated city or municipality within this state without a license: Provided, said soldier or sailor is engaged in the vending, hawking and peddling of said goods, wares, fruits or merchandise for nimself only.

SEC. 2. Upon the presentation of his certificate of discharge to the clerk of any county, town, village, incortion be presentation. porated city or municipality in this state, and showing elerk. proofs of his identity as the person named in his certificate of honorable discharge, the clerk shall issue to said exunion soldier or sailor a license, but such license shall be free, and said clerk shall not collect or demand for the county, town, village, incorporated city or municipality any fee therefor. Any clerk of any county, town, village. incorporated city or municipality in this state who shall violate any of the foregoing provisions of this act, by failing or refusing to comply with such provisions, as herein directed, shall be fined in a sum not less than ten dollars (\$10) nor more than fifty dollars (\$50), to which may be added imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding ten days.

This act shall take effect and be in force from SEC. 3. and after its passage.
