

and published in the county in the English language for a period of at least one year immediately preceding designation, and having had general circulation in the county during such period, shall be deemed eligible to be designated for the publication of the notice and list of delinquent real property as provided in section four (4) of this act, except that in counties having a population of seventy-five thousand (75,000) or more, the newspapers so designated must also conform to the requirements of section seven thousand nine hundred and ninety-two of the General Statutes of one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four (1894) defining a daily newspaper and amendments thereto.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

CHAPTER 350.

Clerical
work and
printing of
municipal
corporations.

An act amending section one (1) of chapter one hundred twenty-nine (129) of the General Laws of Minnesota for 1901, being an act authorizing and requiring certain municipal corporations to pay for certain clerical work and printing done for the charter commission of such municipal corporations.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Minnesota:

SECTION 1. Any municipal corporation in the State of Minnesota in which a board of fifteen freeholders has been, or may hereafter be, appointed for the purpose of framing a charter under the provisions of chapter 351 of the General Laws of Minnesota for 1899, or any acts amendatory thereof, is hereby authorized and required to pay a reasonable compensation for any stenographer, or attorney which said board of fifteen freeholders may deem it advisable to employ to assist in doing clerical work, or rendering legal services for said board in the framing of such charter, and also for printing such charter if so directed by the board. Such expenditures, however, not to exceed the sum of five hundred (500) dollars.

SEC. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.
